Branch of National Association to Be Chartered Here.
PLAN MEETING FOR NEXT MONTH
Joel B. Spingarn of New York Will Be Here to Help in Organizing with Whites and Colored.
Plans are afoot for the chartering of a branch in Omaha of the National Association for the Advancement of the Colored People.
Last August an embryonic branch was formed with Rev. John Albert Williams as president, but it could not, under the rules, obtain a charter, because composed only of colored folk. The rules of the association require a membership of white and colored before issuing a charter.
Therefore a public meeting is planned for January 22, in the city council chamber for the purpose of effecting such an organization. Joel B. Spingarn of New York, a prominent educator and capitalist, who is one of the leaders in this movement, promises to be in Omaha at that time and address the meeting. He is to tour the west and will include Omaha in his itinerary if feasible.
"No expense to us locally is attached to Mr. Spingarn's engagement," says Rev. John Albert Williams. "Mr. Spingarn is a millionaire and a very philanthropic gentleman, paying all of his own expenses on these trips over the country. We shall seek to assist representative Omaha men in this movement, giving it a sound personnel; it is a splendid institution, its aims are high. Its sole purpose is the advancement of the colored race. The mixed character of its membership, is a symbolical of its conception, that the so-called negro problems are mutual. Interest to whites and blacks and are to be worked out in sympathetic mutual interest."
OMAHANS MAY BUY SUNDAY'S PROPERTIES AT DES MOINES
Omaha supporters of Billy Sunday are arranging to buy the properties he has been using in Des Moines and bring them to Omaha for use in the building that will be built at Twentieth and Leavenworth streets for the meetings he will hold here next May. They include seat ends, windows and similar lumber and millwork. Sunday will close his revival at Des Moines in about a week.

E. A. Taylor has been given charge of the men's insane ward. Those changes will be effective January 1.
