KENNERDELL HERE TO FIX RACE DATES

Head of A. A. A. Visits Local Speedway Officials and Discusses Time of Opening Meet.

MANAGEMENT FAVORS JULY 1. Ref Tacoma Has that Date and Its Consent Must Be Obtained in Order to Secure Sanction for This City.

This track will be one of the most spectacular tracks in the country, declared Richard Kennerdell, chairman of the board of the American Automobile association, as he cast his first glance over the Omaha auto speedway yesterday afternoon.

Even though a full length grandstand is built for the opening day, it should be packed if Omaha and Nebraska find the pleasure in automobile racing. That all other persons in the country do.

Mr. Kennerdell was the guest of the speedway management yesterday. He was brought here for the discussion of an opening date.

The management is desirous of July 5, but Tacoma applied and received that date some time ago. Mr. Kennerdell suggested that a letter be written him by Sheriff McHague, who is as familiar with the automobile racing game as any man in the country, asking for July 5, and setting forth reasons why the Omaha meet will not conflict with the one to be held in Tacoma.

Mr. Kennerdell will do that and Mr. Kennerdell will send Tacoma a copy of the letter, asking if Tacoma has any objection. If not, the opening race will be held here that day.

Such a schedule would bring the best drivers in the world here, as they would get four chances at big purses where they usually get but one or two in the same length of time.

The speedway has also put in a reservation for dates between September 15 and October 15. In addition to the opening race, a big meet will be held sometime during or close to the Ak-Sar-Ben carnival.
