State Auditor, in Report, Urges More Businesslike Method for Postage Control.

NEW APPROPRIATION SYSTEM

Believes in Giving State Board of Institutions

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Dec. 22.-(Special.)-In his eport filed with the governor morning State Auditor W. B. Howard if the two powers that would be should advocates a central station in the state house from which all supplies of stamps shall be issued upon requisition made by the department desiring them. He believes a better method should be used regarding payment of salaries and that it is necessary that more equalizing of the same be made. He urges that in reports of commissions and reports of state departments before stating the number of copies to be printed the legislature should consult with the departments and commissions and no more copies be printed than are actually needed.

He requests that a better method be used in issuing vouchers and that the department using vouchers should be required to pay for the voucrers used instead of having the auditor's office furnish and pay for all vouchers used by made up and presented to the state sen- the other departments. He does not believe in an employe drawing two salaries and recommends when an employe is working for the state at a stated salary that they be not allowed to draw extra

Lump Sum for State Board.

He recommends also the appropriation of a lump sum for the use of the Board of Control for the payment of salaries and maintenance at state institutions and that no personal bonds be accepted by the state, as now is the case, and that the state pay the premium on all bonds. He believes the custom of allowing female attendants to accompany female prisoners to the state institutions is all right, but there is no law covering that proposition and he believes such provision should be made.


