Features of the Trading and Closing Prices on Board of Trade. CHICAGO, Dec. 3.—Heavy profit-tak-ing by large holders, including a widely known speculator, gave the wheat mar-ket today a sharp setback after a de-cided advance. The selling was influ-enced to some extent by fear that Argen-tine offerings would cut considerable figure in the near future. The market closed unsettled at a decline of Use to likelise net. Corn finished that to fall in carnest until announcement was made that the Argentine experiale surplus was now estimated at 130,000,000 hushels, a total much greater than the trade had any previous reason to look for. More-over, the quality of the Argentine crop was said to be exceptionally good. Sales here that ensued amounted to millions of bushels, and led to the most violent bearish reaction that has taken place in weeks. The downward sweep of prices was all the bere sensational on account of an earlier advance to within half a cent of the highest level since the begin-ning of the European war. Unusual buying force at the outset in the wheat market was in a measure due to reports of anxiety in Great Britain.
