## FINAL PROPOSITION MADD FOR YANKEES

Ruppert and Houston Submit Ultimate Offer to Farrell in New York Deal.

ANSWER BEFORE THIS NOON

President of Gotham Club Agrees to Give a Reply by Eleven O'clock, According to Dan Johnson.

NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—A final proposition for the purchase of the New York American league club by Colonel Jacob Ruppert and Captain T. L. Huston was submitted tonight to Frank J. Farrell, president of the Yanks, according to President B. B. Johnson of the American league. Mr. Johnson in a statement regarding this offer said Mr. Farrell had agreed to confer with his assistants in the club and give an answer tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock.

## COLUMBIA WINS ANOTHER TITLE IN CHESS PLAY

NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—Columbia won another intercollegiate chess championship today, easily defeating Harvard, three games to one in the final round of the twenty-third annual tournament which ended with the standing of the teams as follows: Columbia, 10; Princeton, 5 1/2; Harvard, 5; Yale (last year's winner), 3 1/2. Princeton gained second honors by defeating Yale today, three games to one.

Columbia has won ten championships; Harvard, nine; Yale, two; and Princeton, one; Yale and Harvard tying in 1906.

## DAIRY TOPICS WILL FORM THEME FOR BIG MEETING

LINCOLN, Dec. 30.—(Special.)—A practical course in dairying is afforded by the program for the thirtieth annual meeting of the Nebraska Dairymen's association, which will be held in Lincoln during the week of Organized Agriculture, January 18-22. The meetings of the dairymen will be held January 20 and 21. President E. M. Tuttle of Central City and Secretary R. W. McGinnis have so arranged the papers and discussions that all features of dairy work will be discussed by experts. The cow judging contest is open to all the members of the association. Gold, silver and bronze medals will be awarded the contestants up to eighth place.

Prof. Francis has arranged for a unique educational exhibit. Instead of the usual dairymen's banquet the members will join with the societies of Organized Agriculture in a big banquet to be given Wednesday evening, January 20, at the Lindell hotel.

## IOWAN BUYS OUT FIRM LONG TIME IN LINCOLN

Mr. Robinson came here from Cedar Falls, Ia., about six months ago, where he had been engaged in business for a quarter of a century, and bought an interest in the Sardeson-Hoveland company. He also bought an interest in the Stoddard store at 124 O street, which he transfers in the deal to Messrs. Sardeson and Hoveland. The deal yesterday put Mr. Robinson in complete control of the old firm, while his former partners will continue the business of the Stoddard company.

## SHUGRUE OUTFIGHTS WHITE

Jersey Lad Has Better in Seven of Ten Rounds.

CLEAN, FAST GO ALL ALONG

Eastern Forces Face Nearly Whole Way, While Chicagoan Cool and Confident in Opening Stanzas.

NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—Joe Shugrue of Jersey City outfought Charlie White of Chicago in a ten-round bout at Madison Square Garden last night. Shugrue had the better of seven rounds. Both men weighed in under 133 pounds at 6 o'clock, and their ring-side weights were: Shugrue, 132 1/2; White, 130 1/2. It was a clean, fast fight. Shugrue forced the pace nearly all the way, while White, during the early rounds, was cool and seemingly confident. He met Shugrue's rushes with snappy left hooks and right counters, but he depended mainly on his left hand.

Jersey Lad Has Better. Shugrue shot jab after jab to the face and White retaliated with left hooks and short right crosses, one of which cut Shugrue's nose in the opening round. At times they stood toe to toe in hot mixups, but invariably the Jersey lad had the better of the argument.

Although honors were even in the fourth, White stumbled off his balance and Shugrue caught him with a left swing in the stomach. In the fifth, sixth and seventh Joe forced the fighting and frequently blocked White's returns cleverly. In the eighth the Chicago lad showed aggressiveness and sent in some hard blows to the body as well as hooking right and left to the head and face. At the end of the round he landed a hard left hook far back on the jaw. This was White's best round.

Shugrue kept up his jabbing tactics in the ninth and blocked cleverly, having the best of this session. The final round was full of fast work by both men. White landed some swift left hooks to the face and also had the better of the infighting, at which he was not so successful in the previous rounds. He used both hands to advantage, taking the honors of the round in hurricane style.

## BYRNE WILL FURNISH BOND OF SUPERINTENDENT THOMAS

## ADAMS MAY BE DISBARRED

Famous Champion Athlete Charged with Violating Rules.

TWO MEN GIVE AFFIDAVITS

If Allegations Are Proven He Will Be Hereafter Classified as Professional Instead of Amateur All-Round Jumper.

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 30.—The New York Evening Mail publishes today two affidavits which charge that Platt Adams, champion amateur athlete and all-round jumper, has pledged and received money from some of his prizes won at amateur meets. Under the rules of the Amateur Athletic Union, this, if true, would change Adams' status to that of a professional.

The charge against Adams would make his case somewhat similar to that of James Thorpe, who, after he had been proved to be a professional, was forced to return his Olympic prizes. In its story the Evening Mail calls upon Adams to produce all the medals and trophies he has won since his connection with the New York Athletic club. Seils Glynn a Prize. In one of the affidavits T. I. Glynn avows that on January 9, 1914, Adams sold him (Glynn) one of the prizes, a gold ring with a small diamond in it. For this Glynn says he paid \$1. During the fall of 1912 and up to March, 1914, Glynn further avows he frequently accompanied Adams to a downtown jeweler, where in his presence the jeweler "would accept Adams' prizes, which I understood were to be credited to Adams' account."

Lawrence Schenck in the second affidavit, asserts that he bought a ring from Adams which Adams said was a first prize. Schenck further states that Adams had in his (Schenck's) place of business at various times numbers of medals and cups which he said he was going to take to a certain jeweler. Thiemer, Makes Affidavit. At the headquarters of the Amateur Athletic union it was said that nothing was known as to the charges except what was printed today. In 1912 Adams and his brother, Ben, were members of the American team which was sent to Sweden to compete in the Olympic games. Last year's records show that Adams holds the record for the standing high jump of 5 feet 4 1/2 inches.
