

TWO TRUSTY DEMOS PRIED FROM JOBS

House Agrees to Bills Which Do Away with the Fire and Hotel Commissioners.

SENATE WILL PROBABLY CONCUR

LINCOLN, March 22.—(Special.)—Consolidation of departments, legislating tried and true democrats out of office was a stunt performed by the house this morning on recommendation of the house finance committee. House roll 68, placing the fire commission under the jurisdiction of the labor commission and house roll 69, consolidating the hotel commission with the food commission, both passed with votes to spare, the former with only twenty-five votes against it and the latter with fifteen against it.

This means that the fire commissioner Hildahl will have to go back to Alliance and Colonel Phil Ackerman back on the road. Both have been able lieutenants of the governor in past campaigns and have many times earned their spurs as democrats brave and true.

To be thus rudely deprived of their jobs by a democratic committee and a democratic house is the hardest blow of all. Whether the senate will concur in the house action remains to be seen, but it probably will.

Appropriation for Reimbursing Those Whose Stock Killed

LINCOLN, March 22.—(Special.)—A resolution signed by Messrs. Steinmeyer and Herby was adopted in the house Tuesday morning expressing the sense of the chamber that an emergency appropriation bill should be proposed to the legislature by Governor Morehead to reimburse owners of cattle which may be afflicted with foot and mouth disease and killed by the order of the Live Stock Sanitary board. The vote on this question was almost equally divided, but speaker Jackson declared it carried.

On motion by Mr. Mookett, the house referred senate bill No. 22 from the sitting committee back to the insurance committee. Mookett frankly said that his purpose was to have the bill killed. It exempts all insurance companies except life companies from the statutory provision forbidding sale of notes taken in payment for first premiums on insurance policies.

Legislative Proceedings

Bills Recommended to Pass by the Senate Committee of the Whole.

S. F. 23, Mallery of Box Bluffs—Makes Livestock upon railroad right-of-way a misdemeanor. To be applied only to cities and towns.
H. R. 1, Lindsay—Gives holder of school land lease first option to renew, provided his improvements are of value of \$2.50 or more. Amended.
H. R. 1, Mallery of Box Bluffs—Puts administration of workmen's compensation act delegates with the labor commission.

H. R. 12, Saar—Makes road overseers removable from office by county commissioners in cases of refusal to obey orders.

H. R. 22, Hostettler and Harris—Limits exemption of firemen from poll tax, jury service, to the counties in which they live.

H. R. 23, Hoffmeister and Stearns—Waste instead of counties to pay expenses and compensation of commissioners of water districts.

H. R. 24, Stearns of Scott's Bluff—Authorizes irrigation districts to enter into contracts for purchase of water supply from federal government.

H. R. 25, Mallery of Box Bluffs—Two stories high must have fire escapes.

H. R. 26, Hynek—Chief deputy game warden. Warden appointed six deputies, instead of three at not more than \$100 a month. Now appointed by governor.

H. R. 27, Wagoner—Prohibits sale of income tax for domestic purposes a misdemeanor.

H. R. 28, Tibbets—Provides for submitting to voters the question of county highway commission system.

H. R. 29, Smith—Time for holding primary and general election from 8 a. m. to 4 p. m. for holding open polls.

H. R. 30, Richmond—Provides that when 25 per cent of the legal voters of a county shall sign a petition for an issue of bonds for building a court house, the board shall issue same in lieu of an election. The levy shall not exceed 5 mills on the dollar and not amount to over \$100,000.

H. R. 31, Darrow of Johnson—One of the second class shall not be liable for penalties arising from defective streets except upon thirty days notice.

H. R. 32, Saar—Provides for written reports by drainage district boards.

Bills Passed by the Senate.

H. R. 15, Clayburn—More drastic weed-removal law.

H. R. 16, Lancaster Delegation—Enables Lincoln city council to create suburban taxing districts and to assess cost on all land benefited.

H. R. 17, Hogan of Platte—Relieves the state auditor of duty of supplying county clerks with certain records.

H. R. 18, Cronin—Authorizes judge in chambers to issue license of sale to guardian of property.

H. R. 19, Cronin—Authorizes judge in chambers to make heirs proper defendants.

Bills Passed by the House.

H. R. 40, Druzesdow—Double shift for ironmen in Omaha.

H. R. 41, Lancaster Delegation—Provides for creation of districts and assessing special taxes to improve roads leading into Lincoln.

H. R. 42, Fowler—Appropriates \$6.00 to furnish new building at Orthopedic hospital, Lincoln.

H. R. 43, Crankshaw and Lissett—Abolishes junior normal schools.

H. R. 44, Others—Appropriates \$50,000 for a new building at Norfolk hospital for insane.

H. R. 45, Kavanagh and Others—Appropriates library funds of state normal schools for purchasing books and supplies.

H. R. 46, Hunter—Anti-busket shop bill.

H. R. 47, Irrigation Committee—Limits water power franchises to twenty-five years.

H. R. 48, Negley—Provides that time and place of holding elections for election of delegates for county conventions shall be advertised beforehand.

H. R. 49, Negley—Provides that public utility corporations shall forfeit their rights on the streets of a city or village after expiration of franchise term.

H. R. 50, Keimner—Allows religious societies to sell or encumber real estate without an order of court.

H. R. 51, Mowbray—Allows municipalities to condemn private land for the extension of cemeteries.

H. R. 52, Mowbray—For wider and shorter sidewalks by arranging sidewalks in three columns.

Bills Failing to Pass House.

H. R. 53, Mowbray—For special tax on all voters residing in east side of Lincoln.

H. R. 54, Nichols—Requiring casualty insurance companies to report to the labor commission all accidents to persons insured by them.

H. R. 55, Mowbray—For better examination laws.

Big Horn Oil Rig Burns Near Greybull

BASIN, Wyo., March 22.—(Special Telegram.)—At 2 o'clock this morning, the Big Horn Oil and Gas company, one of the pioneer companies in the Basin Greybull field lost another rig by fire, which started just after it had brought in a splendid oil well on the Alford tract, just above Greybull. The drilling was proceeding when the men were astounded by a rush of oil from the hole the dropping of the oil on to the coals of the forge and the whole mass of equipment burst into flames. The loss is about \$5,000. This is the second rig burned for the company within the last three months and the second burned under Superintendent Lamb's twenty years' work in the field.

Judge Who Tried Frank Case Dead

NEW YORK, March 22.—Former Judge L. E. Ryan of Atlanta, who tried and sentenced Leo R. Frank for the murder of Mary Phagan, died here today in the Polyclinic hospital, where he had been a patient since February 26. It was reported that death was due to cancer, but the hospital authorities would not confirm or deny.

GALE STOPS FIGHT IN THE STRAITS

Allied Ships Are Unable to Leave Anchorage at North of Dardanelles Because of Storm.

MORALE OF THE CREWS IS FINE

PARIS, March 22.—A gale blew through the Dardanelles straits yesterday and the allies' ships did not leave their anchorages, says a Havana dispatch from Athens. The morale of the crews on the vessels of the Franco-British fleet is said to be excellent, notwithstanding their losses, and they are eager to get into action.

It seems certain that forts Chanak Kaleas, Hamidieh and Kilid Bahr still are capable of offering a stubborn resistance. A number of Turkish field batteries have been posted along the straits and German howitzers have been mounted on rails so they can be moved quickly to threatened points. This is supposed to explain the firing from certain forts, such as Kum Kale, which were supposed to have been destroyed.

How Bouvet Went Down.
Standing at salute and shouting "vive la France" the officers and crew of the French battleship Bouvet, sunk in the Dardanelles on March 18, went down with their ship, according to the Tendres correspondent of the Athens Patrie, who thus described the action in which the Bouvet and Gaulois were engaged:

"The captain of the Bouvet had been ordered to cross a dangerous mine zone and force a passage to Chanak Kaleas, thus making the allies the master of the strait as far as Nagata. At 12:30 the Bouvet was five miles from Chanak and was firing at Fort Dardanus. It had crossed two mine zones. The Gaulois followed, firing all its guns. The commander of the Bouvet, by a skillful maneuver, avoided two mines which were exploded by a destroyer, but a third struck it in the region of her magazines and it sank by the head.

"Seven survivors of the Bouvet climbed into a boat and spent the night in a bay on the European side of the straits. They were taken off the next day by a British destroyer.

"When the captain of the Gaulois saw the Bouvet was sinking he ordered 'full steam ahead' without an instant's hesitation, but his ship had been struck seven times and he was obliged to put back, anchoring off Mavrais Island."

A dispatch from Mytilene says a division of the allied fleet is still keeping watch on the gulf of Smyrna.

A Greek ship picked up a floating mine near Imbros island and another was found by fishermen near Lemnos.

Seven German Prisoners Drowned

BELLE-ISLE-EN-MER, France, March 22.—(Via Paris.)—Seven German prisoners of war were drowned here today. A severe storm was raging on the coast and they went down to the beach to watch the breakers. They took up a position on a large oscillating rock. The big waves started the stone swaying and the men were thrown into the sea and drowned.
