MEIKLEJOHN TALKS WITH AXE VICTIM

Former Assistant Secretary of War Holds Unique Conversation with J. B. Moore.

MAN DESCRIBED IS CAUGHT

Spiritualism, or psychic power, may yet be brought to bear in securing the conviction of the party or parties who murdered the Moore family, J. B. Moore, his wife, four children and two young women, who were stopping at the Moore home in Villisca, Ia., June 12, 1912, when the crime was committed.

George D. Meiklejohn, assistant secretary of war under President Roosevelt and now practicing attorney with offices in the Brandeis Theater building, asserts that a few days after the murder he held a psychic conversation with the murdered man and, in detailing it, asserts:

"Mrs. Fritz, a trance medium who was clairvoyant, clairaudient and at the time of the murder resided in Omaha, now residing in the state of Washington, called at my office to consult me relative to a bill of sale for some personal property she was selling before her departure for the west, and the following morning I called at her residence to have her execute the bill of sale. As I now recall this was four days after the murder.

"Talks with the Dead." "The medium was seated near a dining table and as I was about to leave her to execute the instrument, she said, 'Mr. Meiklejohn, place your hands on the table as requested, the psychic doing likewise, when she said, 'He says that his name is Moore, the man who was murdered at Villisca, Ia.'

"This was given to the psychic clairaudiently in a whisper which I could hear, but which was too low for me to receive the message direct, and she would repeat it to me. The medium was not under trance and to all appearance was normal.

"The details of the murder were then elicited by me from the entity claiming to be Moore, as indicated by the following questions and answers: 'Is this Moore who was murdered at Villisca, Ia.?' 'Yes.'

"Do you wish to talk with me?' 'Yes. I want to have the negro who murdered me and my family arrested. He is now in Argentine, Kan. He was there this morning, and has gone to Kansas City. He goes there in the morning and returns in the evening. He is living with the negroess in that place.'

"I told him I would give the information to the authorities and detectives at

once, and leave nothing undone to apprehend him.

"Give me the details of the murder, Moore, I said, to which came the answer: 'A negro went to my house in the afternoon and asked my wife for something to eat, and she being afraid of him, turned him away without anything. He left the house, and that night returned and murdered all of us with an axe, and from the house went to the river and washed his bloody clothing. From there he went to Argentine, Kan., where he has been since he killed us living with negroes in that place, going to Kansas City in the car in the morning and returning in the evening. He is in Kansas City today.'

"Describe the negro.' And then came this answer: 'He was a tall, yellow negro.' (Here

his clothing, hat and general appearance were minutely given.)

"I immediately upon my return to my office reported this to James Allan, detective of this city, and urged upon him to go to Villisca and confer with the authorities, and have them send him to Argentine, Kan., to apprehend the criminal.

"What I have stated here will be verified in every detail by Mrs. Fritz.

Immediately after the psychic conversation with the murdered man, Mr. Meiklejohn communicated his information to Allan, the detective, who commenced working along the lines indicated by the spirit. Funds, however, for carrying on the investigation could not be secured, though thereafter correspondence was carried on with officers throughout the country, with the result that Loving

Mitchell was arrested last Saturday night in St. Louis.

According to Mr. Meiklejohn, the description of the man under arrest corresponds exactly with the description given through the Omaha medium.

The city marshal of Villisca has written to James Allan that he recalls that the day prior to the murder of the Moores there were two strange colored men in the town. One was very black and the other was light, or what might be termed yellow, the latter answering the description of the one described to George D. Meiklejohn by the medium. The marshal adds that they were never seen in Villisca after the murder, the opinion being that they went west.
