Health Commissioner Has a Plan of Sanitation Which He Thinks Will Work Out.

Wants List of Lots.

This official wants to get the people thinking along lines of a cleaner and bet ter city at this early date, although spring is still lingering in the lap of winter. He suggests that citizens who will grant the use of vacant lots send their names and the locations of the lots to his office and those desiring to use He also suggests that the children of the city take advantage of next week's school vacation by starting to clean up their yards, placing the refuse and rubbiah in convenient heaps. Later in the spring the mayor will issue his annual spring clean-up proclamation.

Must Clean Lots.

The health commissioner states that owners who decline to grant the use of vacant lots to others who would like to improve them, will be required to clear such lots of all unsightly or unsanitary material.

"It will mean much for Omaha this eason if every citizen will do his or her share this pring to cean up yards and alleys without delay," says the health amissioner.




