CATTLE—There was another very fair run of cattle today, 37 cars being reported in. This leaves the total for the three days at 13,770 head, a heavy falling off as compared with last week's excessive run, but still an average run for this season of the year.

The market this morning was not especially active, but there was a fair demand, with prices about like they were yesterday morning or a little stronger than yesterday's lower end.

Cows and heifers were steady as compared with the best time yesterday, or a little stronger than the weak time. There was, however, not enough change to be worth mentioning.

Feeders and stockers, especially those of good quality, were in very fair request and prices on the better grades firm. Less desirable kinds were at least steady.
