For the last ten days to two weeks the election commissioner's office force has been kept busy registering voters. It is estimated that only one-half of their number are newly registered, however, the remainder give notice of changes of residence.

Omaha's population has been increased by the removal of Jerry Howard from South Omaha to this city, and the old drama of the day have been lifted by the announcement of Mr. Howard himself that he will file for city commissioner. He has been waiting for the consummation of a Greater Omaha, but has grown weary of watchful waiting and decided to come to Omaha when he found that Omaha would not go to him.
