EUGENICS BILL IS KILLED

Only Thirty-Seven House Members Favor Measure When It Comes Up for Passage.

SAY DOCTORS BACKING BILL

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, March 30.—(Special.)—After going through committee of the whole with a big majority vote last Friday, the Mendel-Loyd bill for eugenic marriages went out on third reading by an equally decisive vote today. It received only thirty-seven votes to fifty-four against.

By many members of the house the bill was regarded as a measure in the interest of the doctors. The unsuccessful operation of a similar law in Wisconsin, which has caused many couples to go to other states to be married, had been called to their attention before the vote was taken.

JOSEPH L. ROY, NEMAH COUNTY PIONEER, IS DEAD

AUBURN, Neb., March 30.—(Special.)—Joseph L. Roy, an old-time resident of the county, died at his home here Sunday night. Mr. Roy was past 80 years of age and is survived by his widow and several grown children. Mr. Roy came to Brownville in the fifties and went into the undertaking business, which he continued for years.

STERLING RAILROAD MAN HONORED BY FELLOWS

TECUMSEH, Neb., March 30.—(Special.)—At the recent meeting of the Order of Railway Trainmen, held in Chicago, Will F. Denton of Sterling was elected general chairman, with jurisdiction over all Burlington lines. He is now agent for the Burlington at Sterling, but this place he will have to give up. The new office will require much of his time on the road, and it is likely his headquarters will be located at a more central point on the Burlington.

Baby Chokes to Death

TECUMSEH, Neb., March 30.—(Special.)—Philip Walter, five months old, died at his home here Saturday night. The child was stricken with cholera, and died at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter.

Three Horses Killed by Train

BELLEVILLE, Neb., March 30.—(Special.)—Burlington train No. 18 ran into and killed three horses yesterday three miles east of town. The animals ran onto a bridge ahead of the train and were caught before the engineer had time to stop. They were the property of M. H. Forney. The engine was slightly damaged, but remained on the rails.

Young Man Dies of Apoplexy

DUNBAR, Neb., March 30.—(Special.)—Roy Scarborough was found dead here yesterday afternoon, death being caused by a stroke of apoplexy. He was about 25 years old and had been an invalid since infancy.

(Continued from Page One.) Good citizens of the city of Omaha will object. Throughout the entire campaign, if it can be called such. The Bee has pursued a dignified policy and has kept the people apprised of the progress of the bill, giving a fair hearing to both sides.

J. H. Millard, president of the Omaha National bank: "It is a good thing, it means a greater city and as a result, we will go before the world with a higher standing in many ways."

Ed Walsh: "I am glad to know that the bill has been passed. From now on we go into the big city class, and surely with a population of 170,000 to 200,000 in going to command more respect and attract more attention than one with 125,000 population."

T. F. Godfrey: "I am glad of it. I believe that annexation is going to give us a boom. It will enable us to all pull together with one object in view—growing into the metropolis of the Missouri valley."

John Lewis: "It means that Omaha is bound to now get to the front, with its 200,000 people pulling together. It may tear up and reorganize party lines and party plates, but it is bound to be beneficial to the masses of the people. I like the way The Bee handled the controversy. In all the discussions it stated the positions fairly and without stirring up strife."

Ben A. Baker, attorney: "I am glad the bill has passed. The Bee did good work and the people of all classes ought to feel satisfied with the results. Jonathan Edwards: 'It was only what had to come eventually, and it is probable that the matter has been settled at this time. Now we can go ahead and plan for a great city.'"
