A. A. ARRANGES ITS DATES

Committee Files Schedule Calling for 164 Games with President Chivington of Association.

ENDS A LONG SQUABBLE

CHICAGO, March 30.—A 164-game schedule of the American association was filed today with President Chivington by the schedule committee, which has been squabbling about it for several weeks.

The following dates were made public tonight:

Opening Games—Louisville in Columbus, Indianapolis in Cleveland, Indianapolis in Milwaukee, St. Paul in Minneapolis (afternoon), Kansas City in Milwaukee, Indianapolis in Louisville, Columbus in Cleveland.

Labor Day—Minneapolis in St. Paul (morning), St. Paul in Minneapolis (afternoon), Kansas City in Milwaukee, Cleveland in Columbus, Louisville in Indianapolis.

The schedule committee was composed of George Tebeau, Kansas City, chairman; M. E. Cantillon, Minneapolis, and A. F. Timme, Milwaukee. Tebeau was for a 168-game schedule.

ROADS EARN MORE THAN EVER BEFORE

Towa Expert Says Western Carriers' Profits Greatest in History of the Business.

GAINS BEAT THOSE ON FARMS

CHICAGO, March 30.—Testimony that the western railroads, instead of becoming impoverished, have in the last five years earned more revenue than ever before in their history was offered at the Interstate Commerce commission hearing today of the forty-one western railroads petition for higher rates on certain commodities.

Appearing in opposition to the railroads' plea that they be permitted to charge rates that will yield them at least \$10,000,000 year more revenue, Wayne Ellis, statistician of the Iowa Railroad commission, asserted that the railroads, judged by statistics which he compiled, were prosperous.

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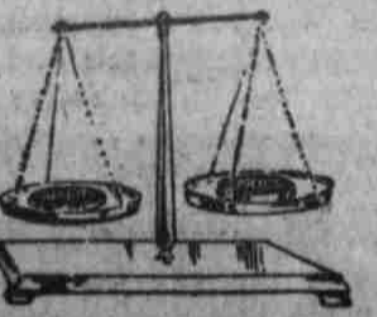
