

HAYANA FIGHT MAD TALKS NOTHING ELSE

Willard Leaves Body Unprotected While Sparring and Black Slower Than of Old.

NEGRO SHOWS NO EXHAUSTION

HAVANA, March 30.—Jack Johnson and Jess Willard continued their training routine today to fit themselves for the heavyweight championship fight in which they are to engage one week hence.

Willard went through all his indoor exercises this afternoon and in addition took on his sparring partners in turn for twelve fast rounds. The big white man went after Charlie Hemphill so vigorously that Hemphill was dazed by one of his blows and Willard was forced to slow down. Willard's left to the head and body were his best blows today. He says he is afraid to use his right against his sparring partners.

Leaves Mouth Open.

Ring followers consider that one of the worst faults of Willard is that he leaves his body unprotected most of the time. He also fights with his mouth open. This morning Willard went over the road jogging and sprinting for five miles. He does not expect to do any work tomorrow. He will make his final spurt Wednesday and then will gradually let down in his training. He says he expects to enter the ring at 225 pounds, so he has six pounds to take off.

Johnson did six miles on the road this morning running and walking. This afternoon in the stadium he punched the bag, threw the medicine ball and then went eight fast rounds, with Bob Armstrong, Collis Bell and another sparring partner. Despite his hard work Johnson showed no signs of exhaustion.

The big black fighter undoubtedly is heavier and seemingly is slower than he was at Reno five years ago, but he says he is satisfied with his condition. He gives his weight as 225 pounds and says he expects to "dry out" an additional five or seven pounds.

Flanagan Arrives

Tom Flanagan of Toronto, who managed Johnson when the negro won the heavyweight championship from Jim Jeffries at Reno, arrived in Havana today. He says Johnson does not look quite as good as he did then, but that he is surprised at his good condition after the lapse of five years. Johnson will be 33 years old Thursday.

WOMEN HOLD MASS MEETING

Advertised Speakers Fail to Appear, but Many Others Demand Women on Public Welfare Board.

BUSINESS MEN ARE TO BLAME

Savoring highly of the suffrage meetings of the fall campaign was the mass meeting called by Mrs. E. A. Capen to further interest in having the mayor appoint two women on the proposed welfare board. The meeting was held Monday afternoon at the Young Men's Christian association, and was attended by over fifty women and perhaps a dozen men.

John L. Kennedy, P. A. Brogan, H. B. Fieharly and others who had promised to attend and make speeches did not arrive, but the speakers present were numerous. A second mass meeting will be called in the near future, Judge A. L. Sutton, John L. Kennedy, Mrs. F. D. Wead, Mrs. J. T. Brillhart and Miss Blanche Van Kuran having been appointed a committee to arrange the meeting.

Among the speakers who urged the need for women on the board were Captain Kings of the Salvation Army, Mrs. Harriet MacMurphy, Mrs. George F. Copper, Thor Jorgensen, Mrs. Jessie Steere, Miss Anna Peterson, T. C. Birmingham, George Kapinski and others. Captain Kings asserted it was the business men of Omaha who were to blame for the non-enforcement of law. "Commissioner Kugel said when he put the lid on and sat on it, the business men made such a hot trail to his office that they must set fire to the carpet, and he had to get off," he explained in characteristic manner. "Omaha needs not only broom-wielders, but club-wielders, to clean out the town," he said.

The captain told the women that if they exercised their power, they could force the commission to appoint women on the board, but he warned them to stick to the job and not go off on a suffrage tangent.

WOULD CHANGE BYLAWS OF COMMERCIAL CLUB

It is proposed in the future to require a petition from 15 per cent of the Commercial club members before any matter passed upon by the executive committee may be submitted back to a referendum vote of the club members. FUNSTON IN BROWNSVILLE

General Arrives at Border City to Watch Situation During Attack on Matamoros.

HURT LIE WHERE THEY FALL

BROWNSVILLE, Tex., March 30.—General Frederick Funston arrived here today from Fort Sam Houston, Tex., to watch over the border situation during the Villa attack on Matamoros. Three batteries of field artillery from San Antonio are due tonight. There had been no renewal of hostilities between the Villa and Carranza factions up to 1 o'clock this afternoon and nothing to indicate when they would be resumed. The United States artillery is being brought here to guard against firing across the border, two persons having been wounded here during fighting last Saturday.

Lying Where They Fell

Villa soldiers who fell wounded in Saturday's attack on Matamoros are said still to be lying where they dropped and today H. C. Harrison, an American Red Cross official, sought permission from the Matamoros commander to bring them in. The commander, General F. P. Nafarrete, replied he had men out gathering the wounded and placing them in Matamoros hospitals as rapidly as possible.

It was said in Matamoros today that the 1,200 or 1,500 Carranza soldiers disembarked at the mouth of the Rio Grande from the transport Oaxaca would seek to join General Hildesmo Vasquez's forces south of Matamoros, instead of going to Matamoros.

Nothing further has been heard today of reported Villa reinforcements enroute. It was reported the Matamoros garrison has planted dynamite at the approaches to the town and believe they could prevent 10,000 men from passing these mines.

Fighting Near Douglas, Ariz.

DOUGLAS, Ariz., March 30.—Five hundred Carranza troops, under Colonel Miguel Samaniego, and a Villa force of the same size, commanded by General Trujillo, came into contact yesterday opposite San Bernardino, Ariz., sixteen miles east of here. The fighting continued today and Samaniego, reinforced by 400 men from Agua Prieta last night, appeared to be slowly forcing Trujillo back. Nine troops of United States cavalry, belonging to the Second brigade, were or-

deared out to observe the fighting.

Samaniego was trying to reach Agua Prieta from the interior of Sonora when he was intercepted by Trujillo.

General Arroy Neve Torreon. EL PASO, Tex., March 30.—The threatening of Torreon by the troops of the Gutierrez faction has caused the hasty return there from Monterey of General Villa, said persons arriving from the south. Villa was expected to arrive today at Torreon to confer with General Ignacio Triano, the garrison commander.

While no attack has yet been made on Torreon, passengers declared that fighting had been going on south between the Villa and Gutierrez forces, headed by Generals Robles and Benavides. Minor Merriweather, the Annapolis academy graduate who has been held several days at Saltillo on a charge of smuggling counterfeit money, arrived safely here today. He had been threatened with the death penalty, but finally was expelled from the country by the Villa officials. He had previously been arrested and released on the same charge.

Williams Threatens New Laredo.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., March 30.—Brigadier General Robert K. Evans, commanding the American troops at Laredo, Tex., today notified department headquarters at Fort Sam Houston, near here, that an attack on Nuevo Laredo, Mex., by Villa troops was expected and that more American troops might be needed on the Texas border to protect neutrality. The Laredo garrison at present consists of one regiment of infantry, one battery of artillery and four troops of cavalry.

NO HOPE FOR RECOVERY OF WILLIAM T. CANADA

William T. Canada, whose illness developed into dropsy after being taken to St. Catherine's hospital several weeks ago, is very low and hope for his recovery has been abandoned. Several days ago he showed signs of improvement. This improvement in his condition continued until Monday, when a relapse came, and since then he had been gradually sinking. He is unconscious.
