

### SENATE POSTPONES INTERURBAN BILL

Measure Relaxing Provisions with Respect to Issuing Stocks and Bonds Killed.

#### NOTICE IS GIVEN TO INVESTORS

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, April 1.—(Special.)—Whether it was intended as an April fool joke or not, Nebraska got a solar plexus blow this morning when the senate indefinitely postponed senate file No. 130, a bill to promote interurban railway building in Nebraska.

The bill was killed by the senate committee of the whole after Dodge of Douglas had made its recommendation for specific amendment. It had previously been advanced to third reading by a narrow margin.

The bill was made the subject of bitter attack by reason of its liberality in amending the stocks and bonds act. Dodge sought to amend it, but evidently his amendment came too late. Eighteen voted to kill the bill, as against fourteen for it.

Backed in Douglas. The bill had strong Douglas county backing, including the Omaha Commercial club. It provided that bonds up to \$30,000 a mile could be issued. The only restriction was that the company must realize 70 per cent on the sale of bonds, allowing 20 per cent for discounts and commissions.

Beal and Shumway led the attack on the bill. Dodge and Quinby were its defenders. Dodge explained that a reasonable amount was absolute necessary for development purposes. Twenty per cent would have to be struck off as discount in order to find a market. That would allow only 5 per cent for what some people termed "promotion" purposes. He made a strong plea for the people that took the hazards of such interurban development.

#### Holding It for Nebraskans.

Shumway and Beal argued that the people of Nebraska would in good time build their own interurbans and that there was no particular necessity for giving eastern capital any concessions.

### LOUISVILLE SALOON MAN SUED FOR TEN THOUSAND

PLATTSMOUTH, Neb., April 1.—(Special.)—Levi Everett has brought suit in the Cass county district court to collect from Henry E. Thiele, a saloon keeper in Louisville, and his bonding company, the Illinois Surety company of Chicago, the sum of \$10,000 damages.

In his petition the plaintiff alleges that while in the saloon of Thiele he was sold, given and furnished with intoxicating liquors on May 6 last; that by reason of that fact the plaintiff wandered out on the Burlington railroad, and while attempting to walk along the track under the influence of liquor, he was struck by a train, the result of being that he was thrown from the track and injured in such a manner as to render him incapable of earning a livelihood, as his injuries are permanent.

The petition further states that he was formerly capable of earning \$75 per month.

### Down With the Jail Feeding Graft

Resolutions Adopted by the Northeast Improvement Club of Omaha.

WHEREAS, We believe that in the provision for paying the sheriff 40 cents per day for feeding county prisoners in Douglas county, as proposed before the legislature in House Roll No. 532, there is an enormous graft and unnecessary expenditure of county funds an unnecessary waste of money and an increase in the taxes of the property owner, and

WHEREAS, The sheriff is paid \$4,000 per year for his services, besides having all mileage and his deputies paid, and that we believe that plenty of competent men can be secured, any one of whom would be glad to feed the county prisoners without compensation, providing the county furnish the food, provisions and supplies, and would do so for the regular salary, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, By the Northeast Improvement club that we stand vigorously opposed to such legislation as would give the sheriff of this county such a graft, in addition to his already overpaid salary, and we ask the legislature to either defeat said bill and proposed act or to so amend it as to make the feeding of prisoners in counties of the population of Douglas county the duty of the sheriff without compensation.

### THOMPSON CASE GOES UP TO SUPREME COURT

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Neb., April 1.—(Special Telegram.)—Della Thompson has appealed to the supreme court her claim as the common law wife of Charles W. Thompson, in which the Douglas county court ruled against her. She asked to be declared the wife of Thompson, and for separate maintenance and support, her alleged husband having a short time before inherited \$100,000 from an uncle and having been worth \$65,000 of his own money, according to his wife. Judge Sutton found that the common law relationship had not been proved.

Anton Widmer of Columbus has appealed to the supreme court from the judgment entered against him for \$250 to pay for a subscription of a year and eight months to the Columbus Telegram. The plaintiff, Widmer, pleaded the law forbids the collection of newspaper subscriptions where there has been no definite renewal.

### TREASURER HALL MAKES REPORT OF STATE'S CASH

LINCOLN, April 1.—(Special.)—State Treasurer Hall's monthly statement shows the effects of the monthly remittances that a large majority of the county treasurers are now making. The balance on hand yesterday evening was \$1,231,154.00, as compared with a balance of \$1,111,783.33 a month ago.

Under a law passed by the present legislature the state treasurer is investing his cash funds, or rather 50 per cent of them, in county and state warrants, carrying the latter as cash. The statement shows \$230,822.50 of such warrants on hand; cash on deposit with banks, \$982,331.50; and cash on hand, \$21,000.

Smallpox Taken Over Postoffice. FREMONT, Neb., April 1.—(Special.)—N. W. Small yesterday afternoon assumed the duties of postmaster at Fremont, succeeding B. W. Reynolds, whose term expired this month. Mr. Small has been a resident of Nebraska since 1888, and up to a few years ago was in the newspaper business in Lincoln and Fremont from that early date. He was the victor in the postoffice primary in which there were nine candidates. Mr. Reynolds owns 30 acres adjoining Fremont and will look after his farming interests while living on Easy street. No other changes are scheduled among the post-office forces.

### MANY INCORPORATIONS WITH SECRETARY OF STATE

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, April 1.—(Special.)—Secretary of State Pool received \$2,388.18 in fees and penalties during the month of March. The largest item was \$1,470.18 for filing articles of incorporation; the next largest \$441.10 for corporation permits issued.

Licenses were issued for 421 new motor cars and renewals for 1,383 cars. This money, under the present law, stays with the county treasurers.

Smallpox at Falls City. FALLS CITY, Neb., April 1.—(Special.)—William Stimmons and family moved to this city less than three weeks ago from Norfolk, Neb. Before coming here the family had been in the hospital for smallpox, and now the father and one of the daughters has the malady and are under quarantine. Three of the children have been attending public school since coming here.

New Bank Charter. LINCOLN, April 1.—(Special.)—The State Banking board has granted a charter to the Brainerd State bank, organized with \$20,000 capital and the following officers: Frank C. Horacek, president; Jacob Horacek, vice president; Emil Kavale, vice president.
