It became evident about the middle of the session that selling of wheat had been overdone. Corn swung upward with wheat and as a consequence of reports of liberal cash buying on the part of big industries. The purchasing referred to, however, was said to be merely replacing at a lower price equal amounts sold elsewhere. Predictions that seeding in Iowa and Nebraska would be the latest in years gave some independent firmness to oats. At first, however, the bears had an advantage because of Oklahoma reports of an acreage increase of 35 per cent.
