ROTTERDAM, April 11 .- (Via London, April 11.) -The British steamer, Harpalyce, the first relief hoat of New York state, and under charter to the Commission for Relief in Belgium, has either been torpedoed or sunk by a mine in the North Sea.

The Dutch steamer. Elisabeth, on its voyage from Rotterdam for New York, picked up twenty-two of the crew of the Harpalyce seven miles northeast of Noordhinder lightship and brought them back to Rotterdam.

Twenty-Six Fenred Lost. The Dutch steamer, Constance Catharina, picked up five men and, took them to Nieuwe Waterweg. The steamer carried a crew of fiftythree men, twenty-six of whom, it is feared, have been drowned.

CHARGES SON SHANGHAIED ON VESSEL TO HIS DEATH

NEW ORLEANS, La., April II-Charge that George M. Farmer was shanghaied aboard the British mule ship Anglo-Australian here and that severe treatment afterwards was contributory to his death were made in a \$10,000 libel suit filed against the vessel here today by Edward Farmer, his father. Young Farmer died three days after the vessel left New Orleans February 17 for Avonmouth.

In the petition the father charges that Farmer was taken aboard the vessel in an intoxicated condition and lashed to a stanchion. His treatment, the petition sets forth, resulted in a fit and he died without attention.
