PUBLIC OPINION INFLUENCED

CHICAGO, April 11 .- The havoc wrought among the 30,000 shopmen, whose strike against the so-called J. A. Kochier. Harriman lines in 1911 was lost, was sketched statistically yesterday before the United States commission on Industrial Relations.

The witness was Frank Comerford for many years attorney for the men, One thousand question blanks were sent at random to the strikers thirtyfour months after the strike. His figures, Mr. Comerford explained, applied to these 1,000 men, and he thought that a fair social survey of the whole number could be obtained by multiplying his figures by thirty.

Effects of Strike. Of the 1,000 men whose replies were checked up, according to Mr. Comerford. 186 were single when the strike was called September 30, 1911. There were 1,743 children, a small number which he thought might be traced to low wages and a subnormal scale of living. Forty-two per cent of the mon owned their homes, or were buying them. The strike cost per cent of these their homes, and of the their lowly domiciles to even cheaper quarters. Twelve per cent of the strikers had to sell their furniture and 19 per cer to seek charity. This question, long a source of strife in the Douglas County Agricultural society and the cause of a nearriot at the annual election last October, has at last been settled, and quite permanently, the officers think. As the result of negotiations ratified at a meeting of the thirteen directors of the society Saturday, the Douglas county fair will be held for the next five years, at least, on the twenty-Delegates to Republican Convention five-acre tract just across the road east from Krug park, between Omaha and Benson, and on the street car

Improvements to Be Made. The property belongs to the Metropoli tan Water district. The grounds will be improved with a race track, grandstand and suitable buildings for housing the fair, the agricultural society to meet that expense.

"We are all glad the fair location settled," said Treasurer Louis Henderson after the meeting, "It means that for at least five years the county fair will be held across the road from Krug park, convenient to both Benson and Omaha by street car and auto, and also to the west, main roads.
