Wilson and His Cabinet Members See Senators Defeat Highlanders, Seven to Nothing.

WALTER'S WORK IS FEATURE

WASHINGTON, April 14.—President Wilson, several members of his cabinet and a huge crowd today saw Washington defeat New York by a score of 7 to 0, in the opening game of the baseball season here.

The president began the game by throwing the first ball to Umpire "Bibi" Evans. With Secretary Bryan, Lane, Daniels and Garrison, he remained throughout the game and warmly applauded the best plays.

A base ball bat and ball inscribed with the name of Francis Sayre, the grandson of President Wilson, were presented to the president during the game by Manager Griffith of the Washington team.

The game, played in ideal weather, was featured by the pitching of Walter Johnson, who allowed New York but two hits, and by Williams' catch on Cree's line drive in the fifth with two on bases.

Three of Warhop's four passes, which were followed by hits, resulted in runs.
