KILL PRISONERS WITH MACHINE GUN

Three Hundred and Fifty Villa Captives, Men and Women, Slaughtered as They Surrender.

THEY BAYONET THE WOUNDED

LAREDO, Tex., April 14.—Information tonight from Carranza officers and soldiers in Nuevo Laredo, Mexico, indicated that 350 Villa soldiers, who surrendered after yesterday's battle between Villa and Carranza armies near Huisachito...

It was stated that a Carranza general ordered machine guns turned on one party of surrendering Villa men, resulting in the death of seventy-six in the party.

Another Carranza officer is credited with having killed 120 prisoners with a machine gun, while other Carranza commanders are said to have used revolvers freely, killing Villa men as well as women camp followers.

Carranza officers in Nuevo Laredo say the wholesale executions were ordered in retaliation for alleged similar killing of Carranza forces under General Maclovio Herrera recently by Villa troops.

Sortie Is Effective. BROWNSVILLE, Tex., April 14.—In a sortie today the Carranza garrison at Matamoros inflicted a heavy blow upon the Villa army besieging them.

The sorties drew from the Villa forces their long promised shelling of Matamoros, but the shelling stopped when the Carranza garrison returned to the trenches and tonight the firing had ceased.

To Leave for Border. SAN ANTONIO, Tex., April 14.—Major General Funston, commander of the Southern department, today said he probably would leave here for Brownsville soon to take personal command of the border situation at that point.

Swoboda's Real Name is Schwind; Native of Bremen

PARIS, April 14.—The real name of the man known as Raymond Swoboda, now on trial before a court-martial on charges of arson and espionage, is Raymond Ruff Schwind.

Schwind, declaring the charges against him baseless, complained of the slow progress made in the investigation and appeared disappointed because his lawyer was not permitted to be present during the inquiry.

Schwind obtained an American passport by a subterfuge, according to the Figaro. Knowing that the municipal records of San Francisco were destroyed in the fire which followed the earthquake, he is said to have informed the embassy that he was born in that city.

A London business man is quoted as asserting that he recognizes in Schwind a man once employed by him as a German clerk, who said he was born in Bremen and that his father was a German fiscal official.

Two Cargoes Dyes At Rotterdam to Be Sent to the U. S.

WASHINGTON, April 14.—Arrangements have been completed for the shipment of two cargoes of German dye-stuffs, which were paid for by the American importers before March 1, and are now at Rotterdam.

This information was conveyed to the State department today by the British embassy. The cargoes in question are on the steamers Guantanamo and City of Savannah.

The arrangement is understood to have been effected directly with the British government by the representatives in London of the American textile manufacturers and no provision is made for the supply of dyes to the regular dealers in this country.

No less than sixteen American vessels with cargoes of various descriptions have been detained in British ports recently, according to British officials here, solely because of the failure of the shippers to obtain or use proper certificates and to give notice that conditions laid down by the British government had been complied with.

Another avoidable cause of delay is said by the British officials to be failure of American shippers to separate contraband from other cargoes.

These facts have been brought to the attention of the State department.

COTTON FACTORIES ARE BUSY

Home Consumption During March is Greatest Since Bureau Began Keeping Records.

EXPORTS INCREASING RAPIDLY

WASHINGTON, April 14.—Marked activity in manufacturing and heavy exports were the features of the March cotton statement of the census bureau issued today.

Manufacturers in March used 323,969 bales, exclusive of linters, which is a record for monthly consumption, being 6,000 bales more than has been used in any month since the census bureau began collecting the monthly statistics, two and a half years ago.

Cotton exports amounted to 1,308,873 bales, or almost double what they were in March last year. The month's exports brought the total for the first eight months of the cotton year up to 6,685,613 bales, or 1,246,462 bales under last year's exports for the same period.

This war's effect on cotton exports is indicated in Germany's takings, which for the eight months have been 242,961 bales, against 2,413,712 last year's period. France has taken less than half the quantity it took last year, but Italy has more than doubled its cotton imports from the United States.

Consumption Near Normal. March consumption compared with 490,254 bales used in March a year ago, during the eight months ending March 31 cotton used was 3,578,215 bales, against 2,762,210 the same period the previous year.

Cotton on hand March 31 in manufacturing establishments was 1,746,676 bales, against 1,629,220 last year, and in independent warehouses 3,378,217 bales, against 1,834,908 last year.
