CARDINALS SPEAK AT ANNIVERSARY

Distinguished Churchmen and Laymen Attend Silver Jubilee of American Catholic Uni.

LETTER FROM THE POPE IS READ

WASHINGTON, April 15.—The twenty-fifth anniversary of the Catholic University of America was celebrated here today in the presence of one of the most distinguished assemblages of Catholic clergy and laymen ever gathered in this country. The three American cardinals, eight archbishops, thirty bishops, thirty monsignori, eight heads of religious orders, sixty representatives of colleges and universities, over 300 clergy and hundreds of distinguished laymen and women from all over the United States were present.

The ceremonies began this morning with solemn pontifical mass at St. Patrick's church, at which Cardinal Farley of New York was celebrant and Cardinal Gibbons delivered the sermon; followed by a luncheon, and later academic exercises at which a letter from Pope Benedict XV was read and addresses were delivered by Cardinal O'Connell of Boston, President G. Stanley Hall of the American Association of Universities, Dr. John Cavanaugh, president of Notre Dame university, and Bishop Shahan, rector of the Catholic University of America.

Cardinal Gibbons in the course of his sermon at the pontifical mass said: "The growth of democracy does not imply that each man shall become a law unto himself, but that he shall feel in himself the obligation to obey. If the enacting power has been transferred from the will of the ruler to the will of the people, the binding, coercive power has been laid with greater stress of responsibility than ever before upon the individual conscience. Unless men be taught that obedience is right and honorable and necessary alike for private interest and public weal, legislation will avail but little, the lawmaking power will become a mockery and the people themselves will complain that legislation has been carried to excess."

Cardinal Gibbons' address at the academic exercises on "The Office and Responsibilities of the University in American Life" was in part as follows: "We stand today at the beginning of a new era in the history of higher Catholic education in America. We rejoice in the goodly heritage of these twenty-five years; but we also look with solemn thought to the future.

"The existence of this Catholic university is an evidence quite as much of our interest in our country as of our interest in our church. Both Catholic and American, the university will give force through its service to the country, while its Catholicity will keep it in constant and unerring touch with that tremendous spiritual power which has maintained the whole truth among all nations, in all ages—the Chair of Blessed Peter."

President Hall speaks. President Hall of the American Association of Universities in his address at the academic exercises said in part: "The medieval universities were not fiat institutions, created by church, state or millionaire, but they grew inevitably out of the most needs of the time, and bulls and edicts usually confirmed a status already attained. Their close relations to the church gave to learning a consecration that it never had in antiquity, and which it may never have again. The fifty-five universities established in Europe a century before the discovery of America and their work and its results constitute perhaps the greatest achievement of the middle ages, and their effects upon the progress of Europe and the world has been without precedent or parallel."

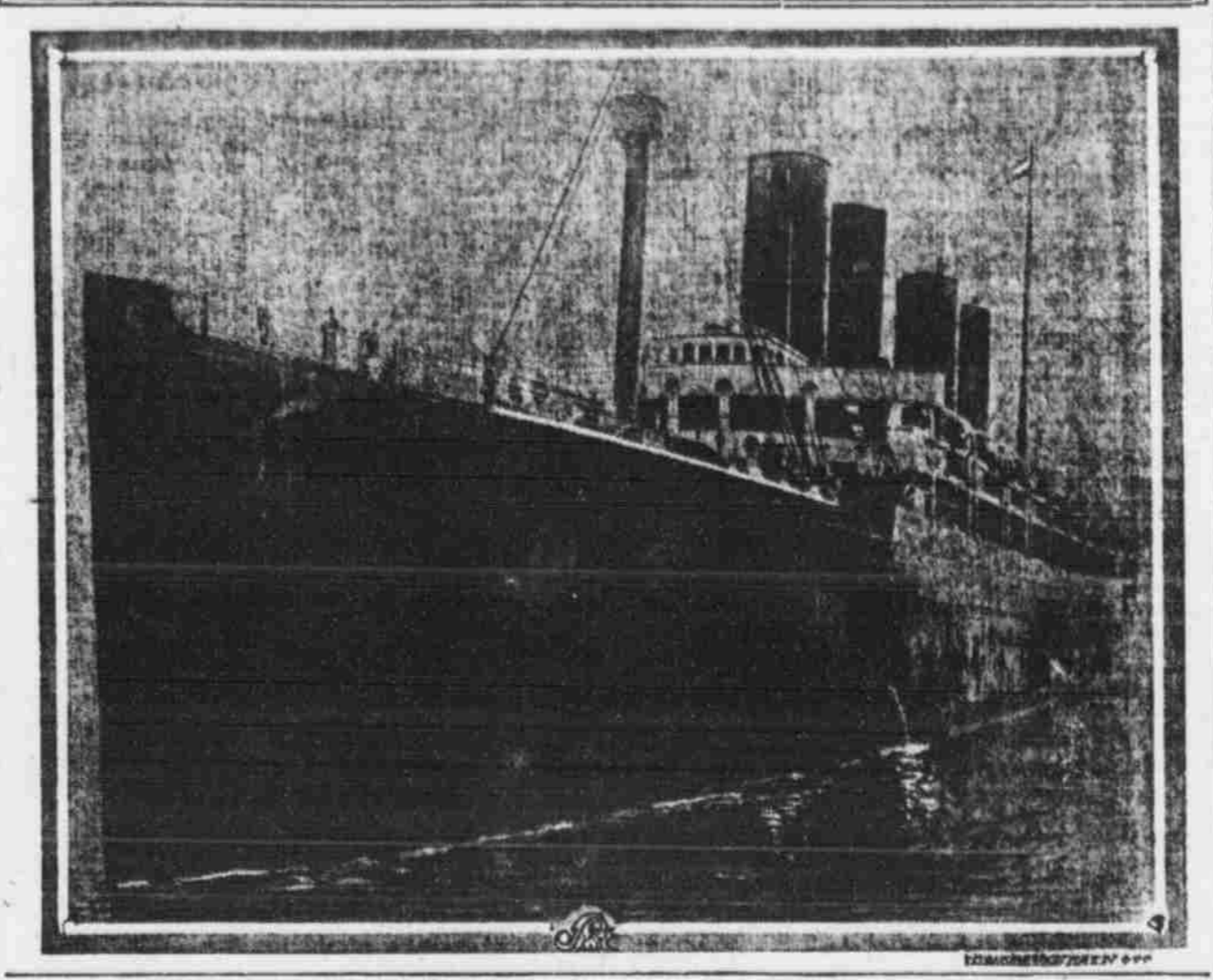
Letter from the Pope. A letter from Pope Benedict XV was read at the exercises today commemorating the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Catholic University of America. The letter speaks in high terms of the work of the university and of the gift of \$500,000 from the Knights of Columbus for the endowment of scholarships. The letter is as follows: "To Our Beloved Sons, James Cardinal Gibbons, Archbishop of Baltimore; John Cardinal Farley, Archbishop of New York; William Cardinal O'Connell, Archbishop of Boston; and to Our Other Venerable Brethren, the Archbishops and Bishops of the United States of America: We have recently learned that preparations were being made at Washington for observing with due solemnity the twenty-fifth anniversary of the founding of the Catholic university, and that the celebration, graced by your presence and by that of distinguished members of the laity, would be quite in keeping with the singularly happy character of the occasion. That you, beloved sons and venerable brethren, should, above all, rejoice at the prosperity of the university is obvious to every one who realizes that the beginnings and the gratifying progress of this seat of learning are owing especially to your wise and timely care. And yet this joy of yours is not so peculiar to you but that we, also, may in some wise share it. For we love—may we dearly cherish—the American people, forsooth as they are with vigor of youth and second to none in efficiency of action and thought; and as we earnestly desire that an ever-widening path to the highest level of human achievement may open before them, so we cannot but feel the deepest pleasure at everything that furthers their progress.

"Still, in your tireless endeavors you aimed not merely at enriching the mind with learning; what you chiefly sought was to imbue it with that heavenly wisdom whose light cannot be put out and with which all good things shall come to your flocks. These proofs, indeed, of your pastoral solicitude must appeal to every fair-minded observer as worthy of the highest commendation and deserving of the appreciation and support of your fellow-citizens, especially of your Catholic people, and in particular of your clergy.

"Princes Knights of Columbus. In this connection we will not withhold our praise from the Knights of Columbus, who, as you lately informed us, by their splendid contribution to the funds of the university have carried into effect their wisely conceived design of extending to young men less favored by fortune the advantages of a solid and at the same time a Christian education. This noble example of beneficence, which all good men approve, we hold up for imitation and generous emulation to all who are blessed with means; and we heartily wish that you yourselves, beloved sons and venerable brethren, will advance the cause of the university by sending to it

UNION CARPENTERS IN CHICAGO STRIKE

Thirteen Thousand Men Will Quit Work When Whistle Blows at 4:30 This Afternoon.

CHICAGO, April 15.—Word went out from union headquarters to "pull out the carpenters when the whistle blows at 4:30." Without a sign of compromise there drew nearer a clash between 13,000 union carpenters and 800 members of the Carpenters-Contractors' association.

It is estimated a strike by the carpenters would throw out of work 60,000 other building mechanics, and if continued would affect 50,000 wage earners in allied industries. Both sides said they were prepared for a long struggle.

"Let them strike," was the defiant message that passed between employers. "It would be business suicide to pay carpenters 70 cents an hour."

YOUNG SCIENTIST Discovers an Anti-Typhus Vaccine

NEW YORK, April 15.—The man of the hour in New York medical circles today was Dr. Harry Plotz, the young bacteriologist of Mount Sinai hospital, who announced last night at a meeting of the New York Pathological society that he had discovered an anti-typhus vaccine.

In view of the recent spread of the dread disease in Serbia, where many physicians are leading in the fight against it, the discovery was hailed by physicians as timely as well as important.

The germ of typhus fever which the new vaccine is intended to combat has been christened by Dr. William H. Welch, head of the medical department of Johns Hopkins university as "Bacillus typhi exanthematus." Dr. Plotz announced.

Dr. Plotz is 25 years old. He entered the pathological laboratory of Mount Sinai hospital as an interne to discover the origin of a fever called Brill's disease, and isolating the germ which caused it. Found that the bacillus was identical with that of typhus fever.

MISS TANZER'S LAWYER PLEADS NOT GUILTY

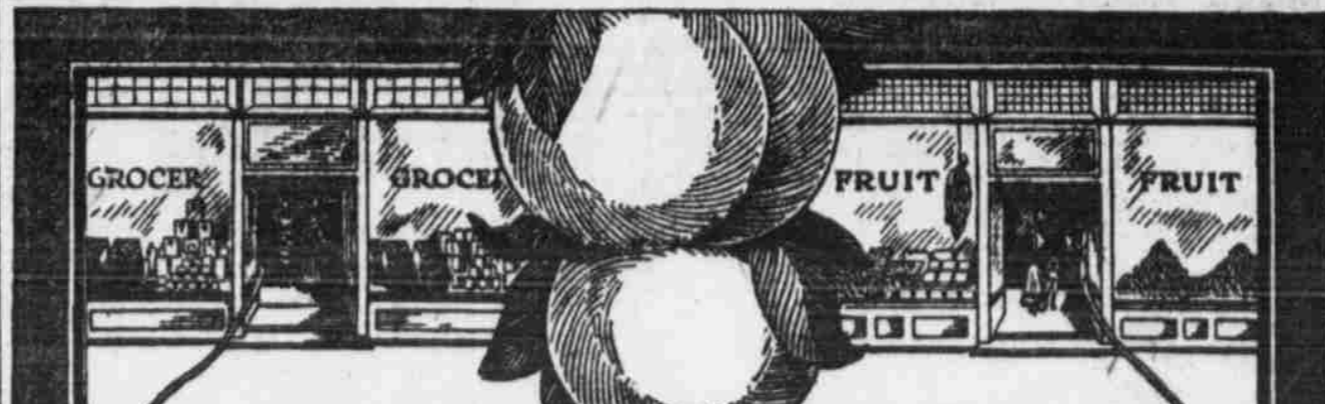

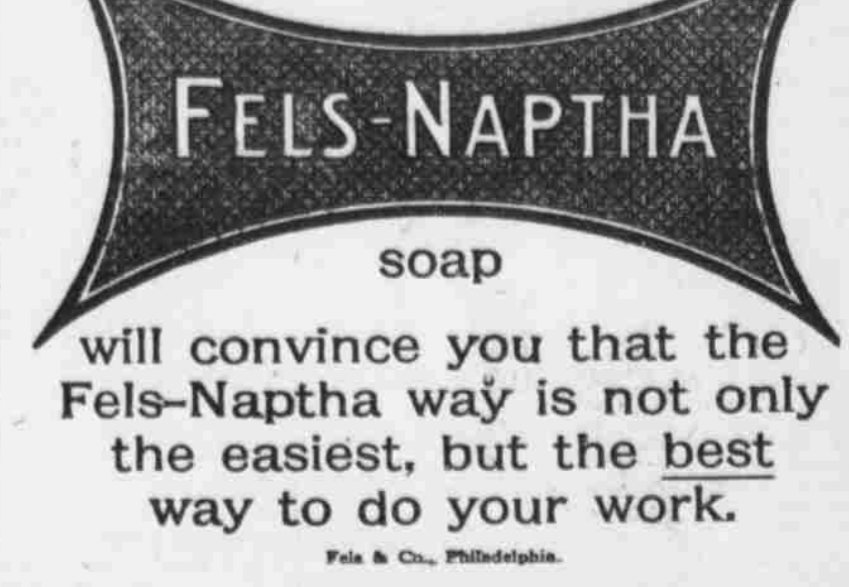
