ALL AUTOMOBILES MUST BE PARKED

New Regulation to Be Enforced in Business District on Certain Streets Set Aside.

WHITE LINES MARK DISTRICT

Superintendent of Police Kugel will begin Sunday to enforce the parking of automobiles on certain downtown streets, which will be marked by white lines in the center of such thoroughfares, the effect of this new regulation being to prohibit unlimited parking of automobiles along the curbing.

The streets to be marked are: Eighteenth and Nineteenth, Harney to Douglas; Seventeenth, Harney to Capitol avenue; Fifteenth, Jackson to Howard; Douglas, Fourteenth to Twentieth; Capitol avenue, Fourteenth to Seventeenth; Howard, Sixteenth to Seventeenth.

Automobile owners and drivers may leave their cars at curbsides for a period of not more than thirty minutes at one time.

To Limit Taxis.
A special provision is made for limited number of taxis to stand in front of the hotels. Two special officers will begin Sunday to enforce this regulation. In cases where cars are found to have been parked at curbsides beyond the legal time and the owners are not at hand, cards will be attached to the cars as a warning, giving information regarding the new regulation. This card feature will be used for a reasonable time, as the chief of police wants to give the motorists a fair opportunity to acquaint themselves with this parking law.

It will be expected that cars parked within the authorized zones will be run in diagonally, thus enabling an easy start when cars are driven away.

The parking of automobiles along curbs in the downtown streets has grown to be a serious situation, some of the curbsings
