

### SEVERAL APPLY FOR JURY COMMISSIONER

But All District Judges Say They Have Not Made Any Selections for the Position.

### MOORHEAD DOES NOT WANT IT

Intense silence concerning the identity of whatever man they may be considering appointing as jury commissioner under the new law signed yesterday by the governor is preserved by the seven district judges.

Although each and every judge declared, "I have not read the bill and no particular man is under consideration," the fact that several applicants for the position have presented their names to the judges is generally known at the court house.

Another fact which has become known is that Election Commissioner Moorhead, who under the law may be appointed, has made no application for the job and does not want it. He announced this fact himself and criticized the law as giving the commissioner who may be appointed too little discretion in making up jury lists. A model key system, which Mr. Moorhead characterized as "hocus pocus" is provided by the jury commissioner act.

"I have made no application for the appointment," said Mr. Moorhead, "and do not want it."

Not as Good Jurors. A class of jurors whose average intelligence will be less than that of jurors now serving in the courts will be the result of the law, Mr. Moorhead predicted, with the probable result, as foreseen by him that judges will find it necessary to excuse fewer business and professional men "because there will be fewer intelligent men on the lists" when selection is made by arithmetical calculation from the registration records and poll books.

"As a result of the focus pocus which he will be required to use in employing the key number system," he said, "the commissioner will not have the body of the county to choose from, but will have about 3,000 men selected by arithmetical calculation. He will have the right to challenge men who may be proven by investigation to be unfit. The challenges may or may not be upheld by the judges. The result probably will be a list of jurors whose average intelligence will not be up to the present standard."

### War Sends Down the Price of Gladiolas

At least the war can be thanked for helping to reduce the price of something. For months prices of almost every article on the market, whether it be food or chemicals, copper or toys, have been mounting skyward as the battle lines have been drawn closer. But now one article has been discovered that is actually a good deal cheaper, wholly because of the war.

The cheaper article is the gladiola and kindred nursery bulbs, imported from Holland. The reason is simple: Holland has been the great source of supply for all Europe, as well as America, in that line of goods. But now Europe is too busy fighting to plant gardens, so practically the entire Dutch export supply is coming to this country, with a natural decline in the market price.

An Omaha florist says that some bulbs that used to bring several dollars per pound may now be bought for 50 or 75 cents per pound. Bulbs generally were never known to be as cheap as they are now, it is said.

### LETTER CARRIERS ENDORSE THE AUDITORIUM BONDS

The local branch, No. 5, of the National Letter Carriers' association, known as the Gate City branch, has endorsed the proposition for the purchase of the Auditorium by the city. At a meeting held in the Swedish auditorium this organization pledged itself to work for the bond issue to buy the City Auditorium, and the members individually pledged themselves to get out and work hard, to do all in their power to bring out a large vote, and to take some one with them to the polls on the bond election.

While the city now has the chance to buy the Auditorium at \$150,000, or the actual indebtedness of the company today, the property is assessed at high as \$250,000. This is what the assessor and the Board of Equalization value the property at, and it is now offered to the city at a trifle over half that amount. The ground itself on which the building stands is 112 feet on Fifteenth street and 324 feet on 112-ward street.
