

STORZ ARE LEADERS IN STATE TOURNEY

Omaha Team at Top in Five-Man Event at the Lincoln Meet.

COCHRAN-SCIPLE IN DOUBLES

LINCOLN, April 16.—(Special Telegram.)—The Omaha bowlers made their first appearance in the state bowling tournament last night and proceeded to carry off all the honors. The Storz team jumped into the lead of the five-man team events with a score of 2,698, with the Forde's of Lincoln second with 2,645, and the Jettors of Omaha third with 2,635.

Cochran and K. Sciple of the Storz team took the lead in the doubles with 1,165 pins, with Balzer and Zimmerman a close second with 1,122 pins. Milson and Remple of Lincoln, the previous leaders, were shoved into third place.

Zarp of the Jettors scored 693 pins down for the leadership of the singles, while Cochran captured second place with 931 pins. Whisenand of Hastings, the previous singles leader, was shoved into third place.

A. O. U. W. FAVOR THE BONDS

Auditorium Proposition Also Meets with Favor at Meeting of the Socialists. TO COST ONLY THE DEBTS. The central committee of the A. O. U. W. has enthusiastically endorsed Auditorium purchase bonds for the city, and the members of the committee have pledged themselves to work personally for the carrying of the bond issue at the polls in May. E. V. Parrish, manager of the bureau of publicity went before the committee at the meeting last night at A. O. U. W. hall and explained the proposition to them, namely that the Auditorium can now be purchased by the city for the actual indebtedness of the property, which is \$150,000 in round numbers.

Mr. Parrish also went before the socialists at a meeting Wednesday night and talked to them about the proposition, explaining that the city needs the Auditorium as a place to hold the larger conventions, the trade shows and the larger gatherings of a semi-public nature as well as some of the large public or semi-public functions occasionally staged by public-spirited citizens. The socialists endorsed the proposed bond issue unanimously.

ZEPPELINS COME AGAIN IN NIGHT

Two Airships Raid East Coast of Britain, Setting Many Buildings Afire with Bombs.

CONSIDERABLE DAMAGE DONE

LONDON, April 16.—Two Zeppelin airships visited the east coast of England shortly after midnight, dropping bombs on several towns, doing considerable damage to property. As far as has been ascertained only one person, a woman, was injured. It is said she was only slightly hurt.

The airships dropped four bombs on Maldon, in Essex county, thirty miles east of London, but no damage resulted. Bombs also were dropped in the Heybridge basin, two miles across the river. These set fire to some buildings.

The airships came up the Blackwater river and over the marshes and circled.

Lumber Yard Fired. At Lowestoft, on the North Sea, in Suffolk county, three bombs were dropped, considerable damage resulting to house property in the center of the town. A lumber yard was set on fire. The window panes in many houses were shattered. Three horses belonging to the railway company were killed.

Previously the aircraft had visited Southwold, twelve miles south of Lowestoft, and having missed striking that town with its missiles went on to Halesworth, eight miles inland. It then returned again to Southwold and dropped six bombs.

Workshop Struck. According to the latest accounts, after leaving Lowestoft the aircraft passed over Harwich in the direction of Felixstowe. It is said now that a dozen bombs were dropped in Maldon, but that only one building, a workshop in the London road, was struck.

Anti-aircraft guns were heard during the night at Gravesend and Sheerness. The authorities had special notices of the air raid, as Dutch telegrams reported that Zeppelins were coming across the sea in the direction of England. Notices were sent to the police authorities of some of the east and south coast towns of possible aerial visitations. These notices enabled the usual precautions to forestall air attacks to be taken in towns and villages.

No accounts of the actual damage done by the bombs of the aircraft is obtainable as yet, the raid having occurred at such a late hour of the night.

OF LATEST TYPE

Skippers of British trawlers, who sighted the Zeppelin airship which last night raided the northeast coast of England, describe it as the "Z-3, one of the very latest type of German airships. The trawlers sighted the craft 10 miles from land. They believe it came from Heligoland. If it returned to that island, the calculation is made that it must have covered on its trip something like 500 miles. The trawlers came at full speed for immediately after they recognized the Zeppelin, with the object of giving warning, but, of course, they were easily outdistanced by the airship.

FIREMEN AT DANCE, Big Fire at Peoria

PEORIA, Ill., April 16.—Fire which broke out in the basement of the Board of Trade building tonight did damage estimated at \$50,000. After a two hours' battle the flames were brought under control. The Western Union offices and equipment are a total loss. The Postal Telegraph company lost two cables, but its service was not seriously interrupted. When the general alarm sounded the Peoria firemen were attending their annual ball and dress suits were covered with rubber coats as they made their way to the fire. Two firemen were overcome by smoke.

LEHIGH ROAD TO SPEND MILLION DOLLARS SOON

WASHINGTON, April 16.—Announcement that the Lehigh railway will soon award contracts involving an expenditure of almost \$1,000,000 as a result of "improved business conditions at this time" was made in a letter to President Wilson from E. B. Thomas, president of the road, which was made public tonight at the White House, with the consent of Mr. Thomas.

Mr. Thomas wrote the president to deny that he meant any criticism of the administration in saying in a recent statement after a call at the White House that the prosperity of the railroads depended largely on the attitude of Washington officials.
