April 21.—Buille' feets of foreigners buying options a unusual extent on the delivery of meat here in September were sharply offset today by news that a land attack was being directed against the Turks west of the Dardanelles and that Italy had begun withholding steamships for use in transporting troops. The market closed unsettled at %c to 1%c net advance. Corn stolid at %c to 1%c net advance. Corn finished with %c to %c gain, oats %c off to 1-160 up, and provisions varying from 7%c decline to a rise of a shade.

Changes in the price of wheat had, as a whole, a sec-saw character from start to finish, but with May contracts relatively most depressed and September developing comparative strength. Rains over a portion of the winter crop belt favored the bears at the outset and so, also, did word of a land movement sgainst Constantinople, but the fact soon became apparent that Europeans were absorbing wholesale the offers in the September option, which has been at a wide discount under July and at an extraordinary difference below May. The all-around bulge that ensued in values gave way in curn to a setback due largely to the latest worlike news on the part of Italy.

In the end the wheat market was again on the upgrade. Shorts were covering freely, disturbed, pernaps, by the export, clearances of more than 1,000,000 bushels in wheat and flour for the day and by a beaut of 1,500,600 bushels in Minneapolis and Duluth stocks since Saturday, with bad weather reports coming from North Dakota.
