Sixteen Persons Killed by Storm in Texas; 11 Missing

AUSTIN, Tex., April 31.-Flood relied work in the districts devastated by Thursday night's rain and electrical atorm proceeded rapidly today under clear skies. City authorities, churches and charitable institutions co-operated in the work.

Revised list of the drowned and missin today gives the number of drowned whose bodies have been recovered at fourteen and the number of missing, believed to

be drowned, as eleven. Railway service was resumed partly to day and salvaging of scores of wrecked houses begun. City officials estimate the less to streets and bridges at \$200,000 and the total less at approximately \$1,000,000.

Two other deaths due to the storm, one at Christoval and the other at Ramsdell, brings the number of known dead in Texas to sixteen. Reassuring advices from southern Texas
