Two Are Given Long Terms in the Pen on White Slave Charge

Walter Gumm was sentenced to three years in the federal prison at Leavenworth, Kan., and Goldie Gumm to fifteen months in the Kansas state penitentiary at Lansing, Kan., by Judge Robert E. Lewis in federal court, after a jury had found them guilty of bringing Mary Shields, a young girl, from Kansas City to this city.

All the parties are mulattoes. Gumm, it was testified in the trial, was being supported by Goldie Gumm. The Shields girl declared she rebelled when she found she was expected to enter an immoral life here. Friends in the tenderloin district finally contributed enough money so that she was enabled to return to her home in Kansas City.

The jury not only found Gumm guilty but recommended that no sentence be shown Walter Gumm. The statute provides a maximum sentence of ten years.

Only men prisoners are kept at Leavenworth, but the Kansas state penitentiary is designated by the federal government for women convicts in this district, because its treatment of women prisoners is especially kind and reformatory in its character.

THROWN FROM BICYCLE AND HAS BONES BROKEN

BOYS IN BLUE BURY ONE WHO WORE GRAY

Omaha Members of G. A. R. Bear Confederate Soldier to Last Resting Place.

REQUEST OF FORMER JOHNNY

Omaha Grand Army of the Republic members carried to the grave yesterday the body of George W. Webb, 2507 Bristol street, a former confederate soldier. The organization officially participated for the

first time in Omaha in the funeral of a soldier who wore the gray, by request of Mr. Webb made before his death.

D. M. Haverly, ledger clerk in the office of the county clerk, who when taken prisoner with 2,000 other union soldiers at Shiloh April 6, 1862, was guarded on his way to Mobile by Mr. Webb and his companions in Company C, Nineteenth Confederate Infantry, was one of the pall bearers. The others were the following members of the local Grand Army of the Republic: W. C. McLean, J. H. Berger, Jonathan Edwards, J. Mallison and Thomas Richie.

Funeral services were held at 2 o'clock at the home of Mr. Webb's daughter, Mrs. Tim Dinan, 2607 Bristol street. Rev. M. V. Highy of the North Presbyterian church presided. Mr. Webb is survived

by his wife and daughter and relatives in Tennessee, who were unable to attend the funeral. Interment was in Forest Lawn cemetery.
