SOME EMPLOYMENT AGENTS TO FIGHT

Others Will Conform at Once to the New Law that Provides Regulation for Them.

LIGHT DEMAND FOR FARM HELP

LINCOLN, April 30.—(Special.)—Labor Commissioner Coffey returned from Omaha last night, where he went to confer with some people over matters in connection with the operation of the new law regarding the state employment bureau, under jurisdiction of the labor commissioner.

Mr. Coffey says he understands that Attorney H. H. Bowes of that city will come to Lincoln either today or tomorrow and ask for an injunction in the district court of Lancaster county to hold up the operation of the law. Mr. Bowes represents several reference agencies which furnish employment of a clerical nature and have nothing to do with those agencies which furnish common laborers. The latter, the commissioner says, are preparing to come under the law and will file their applications and bonds very soon.

Farmers Well Supplied.
The demand for farm hands is so great at labor headquarters at the state house that they have been unable to supply the demand. The general call is for single men who can go on the farm and do farm work. The only individual they have now who is not supplied with a job is a young man from Omaha, 16 years of age, who was a page in the last senate. He would like to go on a farm, but most of the applications so far have been for more mature men.

So far the bureau is well satisfied with the work done.

Will Ask for New Bids.
The state will call for new bids for printing the senate journal, the reports of the board of agriculture, board of horticulture, railway commission and state insurance board. This conclusion was reached this morning by the printing board after a review of the bids and examination of the bonds.

According to Superintendent Ludi of the printing board, the bonds in some cases are not satisfactory and there are other reasons not made public why new bids will be asked for. The board is of the opinion that the bids in some instances were too high, which is sufficient reason for another call.

CARL PETERS OF FREMONT SHOOTS SELF IN HEAD

FREMONT, Neb., April 30.—(Special.)—Dependent over ill health, Carl Peters, a Fremont carpenter, committed suicide by shooting himself through the head at his home here yesterday forenoon. He left a note in the shed where he committed the deed giving directions for the disposition of his body.

Mr. Peters has been suffering with stomach trouble for several months and had been unable to do any work for the last few weeks.

Mr. Peters was a native of Germany and had resided in Fremont for about thirty years. A wife and two daughters, Mrs. Ella Cook of Omaha and Mrs. John Weidner of Fremont, and one son, Louis, of Filger, survive. He was 37 years of age.
