Wool Rate Hearing Extended

WASHINGTON, April 30.—(Special Telegram.)—The Interstate Commerce commission suspended from May 1 until August 25 an increase in wool rates. The new provision for the withdrawal of a commodity rate of 65 cents per 100 pounds on wool in carloads from Belle Fourche and other points in South Dakota to Wichita, Minn., when destined to Buffalo, Pittsburgh and other eastern terminals. The proposed rate is 92 cents per 100.
