

SPEAKERS DEMAND WOMEN ON BOARD

Zimman is Only Candidate to Appear at Y. W. C. A. Meeting, Where Speakers Grow Enthusiastic.

WOMEN ALSO EXPRESS VIEWS

So enthusiastic did political speakers become at a meeting held last evening at the Young Women's Christian association to protest against the mayor's refusal to place one or two women on the proposed welfare board that Frank Odell emphatically stated that not only two women but a majority of women should make up the board.

J. T. Brillhart went him one better and declared that the whole board would be composed of women members if he had his say. Over 200 men and women were present and listened to a long program of speeches. D. C. Patterson introduced the speakers and read pledges of five of the "Big Six" who were not present, promising their support towards placing women on the board if elected.

Zimman Favors Women. Harry B. Zimman, the only "out" candidate in attendance, denied that the "Big Six" had agreed upon who should be chosen for mayor if this ticket was elected, so that no pledge of appointment was in order. He said he himself would not be inclined to confirm a board which would be named unless two or more women were placed upon it.

"A great deal depends on the personnel of the board, as well as the co-operation it is to receive from the community, not by complaining but by sustaining. The promises of the candidates will be of no avail, however, unless you do your duty on election day," he stated.

The speaker urged the women to assist in the work by their influence from now until election day. "Go into training for political development," he advised.

Hollister Takes a Hand. Although the assertion was made by Frank Odell that the speakers were not present to talk politics, the meeting early look on that form. Tom Hollister declared that Mayor Dahlman was seeking only personal advancement. "He has denounced Omaha women as agitators and the people of Omaha should rise en masse and declare to him, 'Get thee hence'."

J. T. Brillhart objected to the vilification of the mayor. "He is merely true to the interests he represents. The welfare board will not solve anything, it will only alleviate conditions," he surmised.

Rev. Charles Savidis, when called upon, mounted the platform, appropriated a pseudo-altar and injected a great deal of humor into the meeting. He assured the audience that in the past he had never believed in petticoat government but now the uplifting influence of women was so greatly needed that he was for it. He declared that present officeholders had failed in their duties.

Reasons for Refusal. Lew Pixley asserted that the administration was doing nothing to uphold the morals of the city and that law enforcement was less effective than ever before. "Mayor Dahlman will not appoint women on the board because it will destroy the harmony in the city hall, since women will refuse to subscribe to the machine's mandates."

As an aside, Mr. Pixley related it had

been said that the mayor would punish the wards which returned a small number of votes for him by curtailing improvements in those wards. "What a beauty spot the Third ward will become," he exclaimed.

Evolution is Not A Modern Theory, Says E. D. Martin

Everett Dean Martin of Des Moines delivered the first of a course of three lectures in Assembly hall, City National bank building, last evening, his subject being "The Evolution of Evolution."

He showed that evolution is not a modern theory, but has been advanced by the foremost minds throughout the centuries.

"Real evolutionists hold the universe to be self-unfolding," he said. "The ancient Greeks were the first evolutionists. Thales sought some reason for the existence of things behind the mere statement that 'Zeus created them.' That 'reason' is merely an antecedent incident. For, if Zeus created things, he must have created himself, and, if he did that, part of him is cause and part is effect; and, if that is true, then that part of him which is cause must have created itself and therefore be part cause and part effect, and so we go back through an infinite number of gradations and arrive nowhere."

"Aristotle was the greatest evolutionist among the Greeks. He believed in a progressive series of animal forms. He actually evolved and stated the Darwinian theory of selection and then discarded it because he lacked the biological data to prove it."

"St. Augustine was a pronounced evolutionist, holding that the world was not created in six literal days, but in six geological periods."

"Erasmus Darwin, grandfather of the great Darwin, wrote a long poem, and a poor poem, which expounded the very theory that was to make his grandson famous. Goethe was another evolutionist. But the greatest evolutionist before Darwin was the Frenchman, Lamarck."

MADE 36 PER CENT ON MEAT TRAFFIC

Northwestern Profited that Much on Packing House Products from Bluffs to Chicago.

TESTIMONY OF RATE EXPERT

CHICAGO, April 30.—Complications of transportation costs and revenues on packing house products were introduced in evidence yesterday before W. M. Daniels, interstate commerce commissioner, hearing the western freight rate case, to show that 40 per cent gross profit was made on such traffic by the Chicago & Alton railroad on its western division, and that a gross profit of 36 per cent was made by the Northwestern railroad on similar traffic from Council Bluffs to Chicago.

Tells of Method. The testimony was given by Fred Pettijohn of St. Paul, an expert accountant, who described in detail the method by which he arrived at his conclusions that fresh meats and packing house products transported on a special contract at a rate of 5 cents below the competitive rate from Kansas City to the Mississippi river, and 8 cents lower than the proposed advance sought by forty-one west-

ern railroad systems, earned the Chicago & Alton road 40 per cent gross profit. Similar tabulations were introduced by the witnesses to show that the packing house products and fresh meat haul of the Chicago & Northwestern road from Council Bluffs to Chicago was nearly as profitable at the present rates, which the railroads are seeking to advance 3 1/2 cents per 100 pounds.

Based on Wheel Reports. On cross-examination exception was taken by C. C. Wright, general solicitor for the Northwestern, to train tonnage figures which were based on conductors' wheel reports.

"The conductor in making out his reports," Mr. Pettijohn said, "states what weight he thinks is in the cars. He is like every one else, and does not want to do any more clerical work than he has to."

"An exact statement of the tonnage could have been obtained by you from the way bills to which you had access, could it not?" Mr. Wright asked.

"I could have it if I had had the time," replied the witness.

"But so far as the revenues you show is concerned it is an approximation," continued Mr. Wright. The witness assented to this.

Later in the cross-examination Mr. Pettijohn asserted that the conductors' wheel reports were used by the railroad companies in reporting their mileage to the Interstate Commerce commission, and were sufficient for all practical purposes.

BURIAL OF H. H. BROWN, OLDEST MASON IN STATE

ELGIN, Neb., April 30.—(Special Telegram.)—The funeral of Hiram H. Brown, the oldest Free Mason in Nebraska, was held today. The services were in charge of the local lodge, of which the deceased was a member.

Upon the death of Past Grand Master Hayes of Norfolk, Mr. Brown became the oldest living Mason in Nebraska and the gold Gordon medal was accordingly bestowed upon him last September. He was made a Mason at St. Charles, Ill., in 1850

and remained a member of the order for over sixty-five years. He was almost 87 years of age at the time of his death and is survived by his wife, who has been his helpmate for sixty-five years lacking but three days.

The services were held at the Presbyterian church, of which he had been a member since its organization in Elgin. They were largely attended by a multitude of friends from far and near.
