

**HITCHCOCK TELLS OF RECOMMENDATIONS**

J. C. Byrne, M. L. Corey and Thomas J. Flynn Are Names Now Before the President.

**ALL WAITING ON MR. BRYAN**

"Yes, I originally recommended Patterson for this place," said Senator G. M. Hitchcock after reading the account of the appointment of Sam Patterson of Arkansas to the position of auditor of the Treasury department. "I recommended him, and I do not know that Mr. Bryan ever definitely recommended a man for the place, but the matter hung fire so long that Mr. Patterson eventually notified me of his withdrawal from the race, as he had taken a position in Dr. P. L. Hall's bank in Lincoln.

"Then later, when no one was appointed to fill the place, I was notified by Mr. Patterson and his friends that Mr. Bryan's endorsement could be secured for Patterson if I would again recommend him. I did so, with the present result."

Senator Hitchcock said so far as he knows this appointment will have no effect on the pending appointments for federal positions in Nebraska. "My recommendations are still pending," he said, "and I have always said that as soon as my men were considered and rejected by the president and proper authorities, I would be ready to offer other recommendations."

Reviews Recommendations.  
Senator Hitchcock, speaking as a representative of The Bee, reviewed the exact succession in which he appointed certain men for the Nebraska places, and the present status of those recommendations, as follows:

"I first recommended Christ Guenther for collector of internal revenue. That hung over for a year. Then Mr. Guenther, asked me to withdraw his name, after Mr. Bryan had said he would not consent to his appointment, and after President Wilson had said he did not like to make the appointment without Mr. Bryan's endorsement.

"Then I recommended J. C. Byrne of Columbus for the position. At the same time I told the secretary of the treasury that if Byrne was not satisfactory, and if Mr. Bryan was not satisfied with him, I stood ready to make another recommendation."

"The attorney general then called on me for recommendations for the positions of marshal and district attorney. That is still pending.

"Then I recommended Swain of Greeley for marshal. Some months after that I again, in view of the delay in appointments, asked him to withdraw his name. I then recommended T. J. Flynn of Omaha for marshal. That is where the matter stands now."

**Lodge of Sorrow to Be Held by Masons**

In memory of three past grand masters of the Nebraska Masonic grand lodge, a lodge of sorrow will be held at the Scottish Rite cathedral, Twentieth and Douglas streets, Sunday afternoon, May 2.

These are the three past grand masters in whose memory the novel ceremonial will be held:

Harry Porter Deuel, died November 23, 1914.

Martin Lunham, died February 15, 1915.

John J. Mason Mercer, died February 26, 1915.

The nine lodges of Greater Omaha will take part jointly in the ceremony. Invitations have been sent to every Masonic lodge in the state, especially to the present and past grand lodge officers.

Judge Samuel B. Davidson of Tecumseh, Harry H. Wilson of Lincoln and William A. DeFord of Omaha will be the speakers. Rev. Edwin Hart Jenks will act as chaplain.
