KAUFF BARRED BY NATIONAL LEAGUE

President Tener Announces that the Late Brookfed Artist Will Not Be Permitted to Play.

BASIS OF CLAIM OF THE GIANTS

His telegram to Mr. Ward was as follows:

Secretary John A. Heydler, speaking for
President John K. Tener of the National league, said the latter official had ruled that yesterday's game between the New York and Boston clubs, won by Boston 13 to 8, was a contest regularly scheduled and played and would be counted in the league records and as standing for a victory for the Boston club.

President Gilmore of the Federal league issued a call for a special meeting of the association, to be held here tomorrow noon, to consider the various phases of the Kauff case. The executive of the Federal league glubs were notified by telegraph to be present. It is understood from sources outside the Federal league that the independent base ball organiza-tion is determined to make a strong fight of this player and others, who have signed contracts with first one league and then another.

Basis for Giants' Claim. Secretary John P. Foster of the New York club said when such a decision was officially received by the New York club, the game would be protested and the matter brought to the attention of the bolled of directors of the National league. Mr. Foster said it was the contention of the New York club that Kauff was the property of the Giants as a result of the agreement entered into between the New York club and the Indianapolis club

Brooklyn Federals have a prior or binding contract with Kauff," said Foster, "then we will withdraw all claim to his services. Kauff assured us that he was not under contract with the Brooklyn
