JOSIES COP GAME IN THE ELEVENTH

Bourkes Pass Up Several Opportunities to Win by Rather Ragged Base Running.

STILL LEAD LOOP, HOWEVER

The Bourke machine slipped a cog yesterday and the lowly Drummers from St. Joseph copped a win from our athletes, 4 to 1, after eleven innings of rather ragged base ball, but it matters not in the per cent column for the obnoxious Grizzlies turned a trick or two in Wichita and the Kansas town was trimmed, thus leaving Omaha still perched at the top of the ladder.

The Josies tried hard to give the game to our side several times, but Marty's athletes were not inclined to take advantage of the proffered gifts. Paul Brown passed out seven swats, six walks and his mates added nine miscues to the effort. On four distinct occasions Bourke runners were nipped rambling promiscuously around the runway without any apparent sense or direction of purpose.

Burney Everton tolled nine rounds for Omaha and pitched fairly steady ball, especially considering it was his first effort this year and he was still nursing a flock of bolts on the back of his neck. Burney had well control, allowed nary a walk and kept the hits pretty well scattered. He expired in the ninth to let Cy Forsythe bat for him, and Franklin Johnson went in to get credit for the loss.

Patterson Turns the Trick.
A blow by Manager Ham Patterson did the work in the fatal eleventh. Fox beat out an infield hit and was sacrificed to second by Watson. Here Patterson injected his only hit into the matinee and it sufficed to ruin the Bourkes.

Omaha got the jump on the invading battalion in the second stanza, but the lead was short-lived. Thomason was given a walk to start the festivities, and Huelman laid down a neat sacrifice. Brown pegged wildly to second to catch Tommy there and the ball rolled into centerfield, while Tommy filed his little self to third. Krueger later a sacrifice fly to Fox, giving Thomason codies of time in which to mark.

Three blows in the fourth put the Josies one to the good. Britton beat out an infield hit and went to second on Williams' drive to right. Both men traveled an extra base when Huelman fouled the ball a moment. O'Day's single to center registered both men.

Bourkes Coast Two.
When Breen deceased in the sixth Krug caught a slant for a hit to right, and went to third on Thomason's poke to the same garden. Tommy was nipped trying to take second when the ball was relayed to third in an ineffectual attempt to catch Krug. Huelman was deliberately walked and he stole second. Krueger slammed a line drive to left, counting the manager and Huelman. Krueger went to third when the pill trickled through Fox, but Schlieper made the third out, ending the rally.

Pass Up Chance in Tenth.
That was all for the Bourkes, although the bases were choked in the eighth, and a fine chance to count occurred in the tenth. The tenth was the saddest round of the quarrel from a home standpoint. Huelman was safe on Willie Patterson's error, and was forced by Krueger. Schlieper and Krueger were both safe on Willie's second fumble, and Whalen drove a head of a hit to center. Krueger stopped to watch the progress of the ball and was, as a result, cut down at the plate by Williams. Schlieper went to third in the interim, and then was caught napping off that bag by Withrow, making a double play that should never have been accomplished.

Britton opened the seventh with a hit for the hostiles. Williams doubted but Britton was caught at the plate trying to score. Williams went to third on the play. He fouled on O'Day's blow. Then came the fatal eleventh and the winning marker for the Jostown athletes.

Whalen Plays Great Game.
Red Whalen played a great game at short. He made three hits and several sensational stops at short. Smith made a great running catch of what looked like a three-bagger from the bat of Fox in the third.
