### CONSOLIDATED SCHOOLS MAKING GOOD IN BROWN

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, May 4.—(Special.)—There is just one consolidated school in Nebraska, and that has been in operation three years, according to a letter received by State Superintendent Thomas from H. C. Sorenson, director of the school at Johnston, in Brown county.

The school is composed of what was formerly district nine and sixty-eight, and when consolidated had a debt of \$1,100. Now the school is out of debt and has \$600 in the treasury. Eight grades were formerly taught in the school, but since its consolidation they are able to teach eleven grades.

### HIGHLINE AGRICULTURAL ASSOCIATION FORMED

FAIRMONT, Neb., May 4.—(Special.)—At a meeting of farmers, stockmen and business men in Wallace Saturday a Highline Agricultural society was formed with the purpose in view of holding a district agricultural and educational fair at some point on the high line between Holdrege and Sterling. Entries in the agricultural section will be confined to the Highline territory, but the stock show is to be wide open. The location will be decided on at an early meeting of the stockholders.

Notes from Beatrice. BEATRICE, Neb., May 4.—(Special.)—Frank Burea, a pioneer resident of Odell, died suddenly at that place of heart trouble. He was deputy assessor for Paddock township. He was 59 years of age and leaves a widow and three children.

The carnival will be held on the public school ground, a program will be given and there will be plenty of strawberries and good, thick cream. Automobiles will be provided to take visitors to inspect the fruit country in the Brownville neighborhood.

### Nebraska BARTON NOT CANDIDATE FOR GRAND MASTER WORKMAN

GRAND ISLAND, Neb., May 4.—(Special.)—In a circular letter addressed to numerous friends in the various Ancient Order of United Workmen lodges of Nebraska, S. R. Barton announces that he will not be a candidate for the position of grand master at the forthcoming biennial session of the grand lodge. In the letter Mr. Barton declares:

I am not unmindful of the loyal interest of my friends, nor of the great honor they would seek to confer upon me, and I appreciate the kind and complimentary sentiments more than I can express. During the next two years the order will need as our grand master a man who can devote all of his time to the work. My plans for the future would not permit my doing so. I have been honored by the order by being elected four terms as grand master.

With these thoughts in my mind, I desire to say that I am not a candidate for any office in the grand lodge. My friends close to the former congressman that he will enter the race a year from the present summer for the republican nomination for congressman from this district, the position he held for the last two years preceding March 1.

### NORTH PLATTE BUILDING WRECKED BY EXPLOSION

NORTH PLATTE, Neb., May 4.—(Special.)—The hot water boiler in the (Special) little bakery exploded Monday morning with terrific force. It blew out the plate glass windows in the front of the building and also caused the rear brick wall of the building to bulge out several inches. The boiler itself went through the floor between the first and second stories of the building and then broke a hole through the roof. Ed Dieter a baker, was probably fatally injured by the explosion. The building was a new modern brick building completed about two years ago. The damage to the building is in the neighborhood of \$2,000 and the only insurance which applies is the plate glass insurance.

### SARGENT WINS DEBATE FROM BROKEN BOW

SARGENT, Neb., May 4.—(Special.)—The final debate for the championship of the west-central district took place at the Freeman opera house here Friday night between Broken Bow and Sargent. It was won by Sargent, which had the affirmative. Ralph Brooks was chosen to go to Lincoln May 15 to take part in the state debate. The Sargent team was on the negative side of the question when winning from St. Paul and Ansley. A fourth election on school house site is called for May 11. This is the third time that the question of the Greibel site against the old site has been called, the old site winning in the three other elections.

### Rural High School Projected.

STELLA, Neb., May 4.—(Special.)—Six school districts in the neighborhood northwest of Stella are making an effort to consolidate into a rural high school, and to erect a building north of Providence church. The plan is receiving favorable consideration among the patrons.

### Nebraska LABOR COMMISSIONER ASKED TO TRACE MARGARET MURPHY

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, May 4.—(Special.)—The state labor bureau has a new duty to perform. This morning Commissioner Coffey received a letter from New York asking for information regarding Margaret Murphy, daughter of Jeremiah Murphy, a civil war veteran, who left that state thirty-five years ago with what was known as the Father Smith ultimatum, and went to Omaha. The letter states that it was rumored that she married a man named McCarthy and they settled in O'Connor.

A number of years ago there was a small settlement in Greeley county known as the "Boston Colony," and the postoffice was called O'Connor. O'Connor is still on the map and lies southeast of Greeley three or four miles. This postoffice was established in the '80s or before, and it is possible that this is where Miss Murphy went, as it was an Irish settlement, and a family by the name of McCarthy resided in that locality.

The sale is all in; those planted earlier are up and looking fine. 
