LUSITANIA CAPTAIN IS RESCUED

LONDON, May 8.—The Times' Queenstown correspondent says that some of the survivors who have arrived there report that Alfred Gwynne Vanderbilt was drowned.

Captain Turner of the Lusitania was among those saved. Mr. Vanderbilt was one of those passengers warned by anonymous letter not to sail from New York because the vessel was in danger from submarines.

Confusion on liner.

That there was great confusion aboard the Lusitania after the steamer was torpedoed is evident from the conflicting statements of survivors some of whom state that it was struck on the starboard side, while others insist it was upon the port side. Captain Turner is among those who have landed here.

The Dublin Times states that the survivor aboard the Tug Storm Cock, all are in a deplorable condition and that some of them are wounded.

Waters Where Liner Torpedoed Shallow

WASHINGTON, May 8.—Navy department charts show that the waters off Kinsale, where the Lusitania is reported to have sunk, are comparatively shallow, ranging from 120 to 200 feet in depth at a distance of nine or ten miles from shore. This, naval officers said tonight, ought to make possible the recovery of valuable property aboard the ship.

FIRST CHIEF JUSTICE OF SOUTH DAKOTA IS DEAD

PIERRE, S. D., May 7.—(Special Telegram)—Judge Dighton Corson, first presiding justice of the supreme court of the state of South Dakota, and for many years upon the bench, died at his home here this morning from old age debility in his eighty-seventh year. He was born in Maine in 1837. He practiced law in Milwaukee, went to Nevada and back to Deadwood and was elected to the supreme bench of the state in 1889. His body will lie in state at the capitol, with funeral Sunday afternoon and will be taken to Leavenworth, Kan., for burial.
