CHINA WILL LIKELY YIELD TO JAPANESE

Official Advices Received in Washington Indicate that Crisis is Averted.

TOKIO IS AWAITING THE REPLY

WASHINGTON, May 8 .- Official advices received here late today were to the effect that a crisis of the far east had been averted, that Japan has modified its demands and that China will accept them.

Before the terms of the agreement are finally concluded, however, an expression of opinion is expected by the United States, from Great Britain, France and Russia, as the allies of Japan, as to whether the interests which the leading powers have had in the maintenance of the territorial integrity of China, or the "open door" policy have been in any way affected.

Asked to Quiz Powers. The American ambassadors at London, Paris and Petrograd have been instructed to learn the attitude of the powers, which, like the United States, are pledged to maintain the territorial status que in China and the freedom of commercial opportunity. 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




