The noted Redick's Grove, as such, will soon be no more. The last of this tract is now platted and is being put on the market by A. P. Tukey & Son.

Interest has always centered around this old spot on account of the great maple grove, in which the big picnic were held in the pioneer days of Omaha's history.

Redick's Grove originally comprised 100 acres of the farm homesteaded by a man named Weatherwax. In 1861, going to war, he sold 100 acres to John I. Redick.

John I. Redick first laid out Redick's Grove addition, which was afterwards replatted into Redick's subdivision.

W. A. Redick's second addition is the last of this famous tract available for plating.

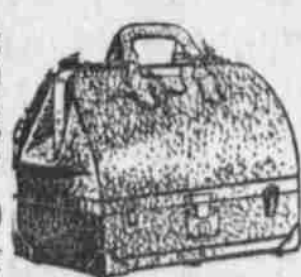
