John C. Drexel and Walter S. Jardine, the new commissioners, will be assigned to the departments of street maintenance and public improvements, respectively.

Commissioner McGovern, who was defeated by Mr. Jardine by thirty-four votes, will turn over his office to his successor, but will make such legal reservation as is usual in cases where accounts are requested. Mr. McGovern will ask for a recount and believes there is a possibility that his narrow margin may be overcome.
