Sodies of 140 Victims of the Lusitania Buried at Queenstown with Full Honors.

WILL SEND AMERICANS HOME

QUEENSTOWN, May 9 .- (Via Londay, May 10.1-Affidavits made by Miss Jessie Taft Smith of Bracerille, O.; Dr. Howard L. Fisher, Major F. Warren Pearl and Robert Rankin of New York are the only permanent records of the Lusitania disaster obtained by the United State consulate. All are brief and none reflects seriously upon the behavior of the Lusitania crew except what some witnesses consider the lifeboat fiasco. The affidavits of Miss Smith and Mr. Rankin were sabled tonight to Secretary of State Bryan, while those of Major Pearls and Dr. Fisher were sent to Ampassador Page at London.

Beginning at noon today, at Consul Frost's orders, the bodies of the identihed Americans, covered with the Stars and Stripes, were removed from scattered morgues and placed side by side in the unard line offices on the water front. 
