FEW AMERICAN SHIPS CROSS THE WAR ZONE

NEW YORK, May 12.-Shipping records show that since May 7 fifty-six vessels have departed from American or Canadian ports for European ports, or vice versa, whose courses take them through the zone of German submarines activity. Of these only three are American, the Philadelphia, which left New York May 8 for Liverpool; the St. Paul, Liverpool, May 8 for New York, both passenger ships, and the Ruby, merchant ship, New York, May 11 for London. The St. Paul should have been well past the war zone today.




