New Yorks Perk Up and Defeat the Cleveland Club on Grounds of Latter.

TRIPLE PLAY BY THE INDIANS

CLEVELAND, May 12.—Wood's error, Peck's triple and a wild pitch by Walker were the principal factors in New York's four-run rally in the seventh inning, which gave New York the victory, 4 to 2.

JARDINE FINDS PLACE FOR BEAL

Appoints Him Chief Inspector in the Department of Public Improvements.

CRAIG MATTER STILL IN AIR. Herman Beal, city engineer of South Omaha, has been appointed chief inspector in the department of public improvements by Commissioner Jardine. Mr. Beal's probable appointment to a position in this department has been a matter of discussion in the position of city engineer and unofficially it has been stated that when the new commissioner completes his reorganization Mr. Beal will have an engineering position in which his knowledge of South Omaha will stand him instead in the event of consolidation.

"I have placed Mr. Beal on general inspection and field work for the time being, at least. I am not prepared to state what later plans will be made," stated Commissioner Jardine, who also declared he is not ready to say whether George W. Craig, former city engineer, will return to this city to resume his former position in the city hall.

Mr. Beal is out on the work with City Engineer Townsend. Prominent German citizens have been working hard in behalf of the South Omaha engineer.
