

MRS. BALTZLY HEAD OF WOMEN'S SOCIETY

Omaha Woman President of the Women's Home and Foreign Missionary Society.

NEXT YEAR AT WHEELING

Mrs. O. D. Baltzly, wife of the pastor of Kountze Memorial Lutheran church, was unanimously elected national president of the Women's Home and Foreign Missionary society of the general synod of the Lutheran church at the final session of the convention Thursday.

Mrs. Baltzly is the first president of this big organization to be elected from west of the Mississippi river.

Other officers were elected as follows: Vice presidents, Mrs. Willard Larkin of Cobleskill, N. Y.; Mrs. J. P. Krechting of Washington, D. C.; Mrs. A. V. Hunter of Columbia City, Ind.; Mrs. Alice G. Bond of Salina, Kan., and Mrs. J. H. W. Stuckenborg of Wooster, O.; recording secretary, Miss Margery D. H. Lilly of Mechanicsburg, Pa.; corresponding secretary, Miss Mary Hay Morris of Lutherville, Md.; treasurer, Miss M. Margaret Miller of Kansas City, Mo.; historian, Mrs. E. B. School of Baltimore, Md.

Next Year in Wheeling. Wheeling, W. Va., won the contest for the next meeting place. Telegrams were received from all the Lutheran churches in that place and from the Wheeling Board of Trade and the Wheeling Board of Control.

"It has been a most successful convention," said Dr. Baltzly. "The weather has been good and everything has cooperated to success. Omaha has been splendidly advertised to influential people from all over the country. One day we took the delegates on a thirty-mile automobile trip around the city and they were loud in their praises of Omaha."

All noon and evening meals were served in the church parlors. The ladies of St. Mark's church provided and served the meals on Wednesday.

The convention ended its six days' session at noon Thursday. The delegates are departing, most of them not going directly to their own homes. Some will go to the Pacific coast to visit the expositions. Others are leaving for Lincoln to see the Tabitha home, an institution for orphans, the aged, and a hospital. Still others are going to Atchison, Kan., where there is the Western Theological seminary and a large Lutheran college.

Two Big Conventions Scheduled on Same Dates This Fall

Omaha will be called upon to entertain two gigantic conventions with a total of 5,000 delegates during the same week this fall. This is the week selected two years ago by the National Letter Carriers association and now comes C. H. Gustafson of Mead, who says that all arrangements have been made for the meeting here of the State Farmers' union September 7, 8 and 9. They say they will have 1,500 delegates and the letter carriers expect 3,500 delegates.

ROBISON BUYS A SECTION NEAR CITY

Insurance Man Pays \$100,000 for Four-Fifths of the Old Hallenbeck Farm.

ABOUT MILE WEST OF MILLARD

One of the largest single sales of farm lands made in Douglas county for some time is the sale the Payne Investment company has just closed with B. H. Robison, president of the Bankers' Reserve Life Insurance company, who purchased a section of land just west of Millard for \$100,000. The section of ground is four of the five quarters of the John Hal-

lenbeck estate at that place. The price paid amounts to \$156.25 per acre.

When John Hallenbeck, one of the early pioneers of this section of the country, died last September at the age of 87 years, he left his large real estate holdings to his relatives. The executors are Messrs. Hallenbeck and Brown, nephews of the late Mr. Hallenbeck. They live at Gloversville, N. Y. They will authorized them to sell this land and divide the proceeds among the heirs. The executors placed the lands in the hands of the Payne Investment company of Omaha for disposal. The real estate company placed a price upon each quarter separately and issued a pamphlet showing the lay of the ground and specifying the price asked for each quarter. Negotiations with Mr. Robison led to the purchase of a single deal of four adjoining quarters of the land one and a half miles west of Millard. Negotiations are on with another party for the purchase of the remaining quarter. Mr. Hallenbeck arrived in Omaha from

New York in 1862. Omaha was little more than a fort then where the settlers periodically gathered to escape the ravages of the Indians. He took up 160 acres of land west of Millard and later purchased more, which now constitutes the farm land holdings of the estate the Payne Investment company is closing out. The land purchased by Mr. Robison has one set of farm buildings now on it. Mr. Robison expects to spend \$20,000 in equipping the place for a first class stock farm which he intends to stock immediately with thoroughbred Herefords. He has engaged the services of an expert herdman from Iowa who is to take charge of the Hereford farm.

The Maney Milling company is building an addition to its elevator and storage house at Twenty-seventh and Arbor streets, which is expected to double its storage capacity.

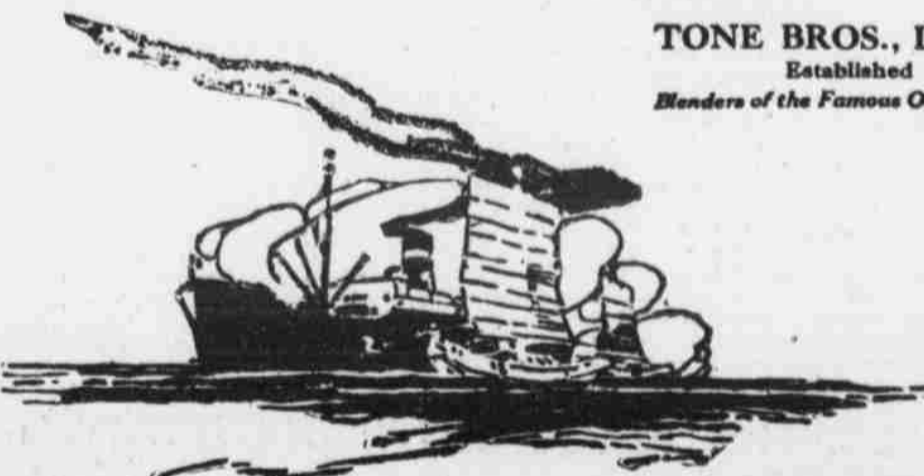

What Certified Milk Really Is:

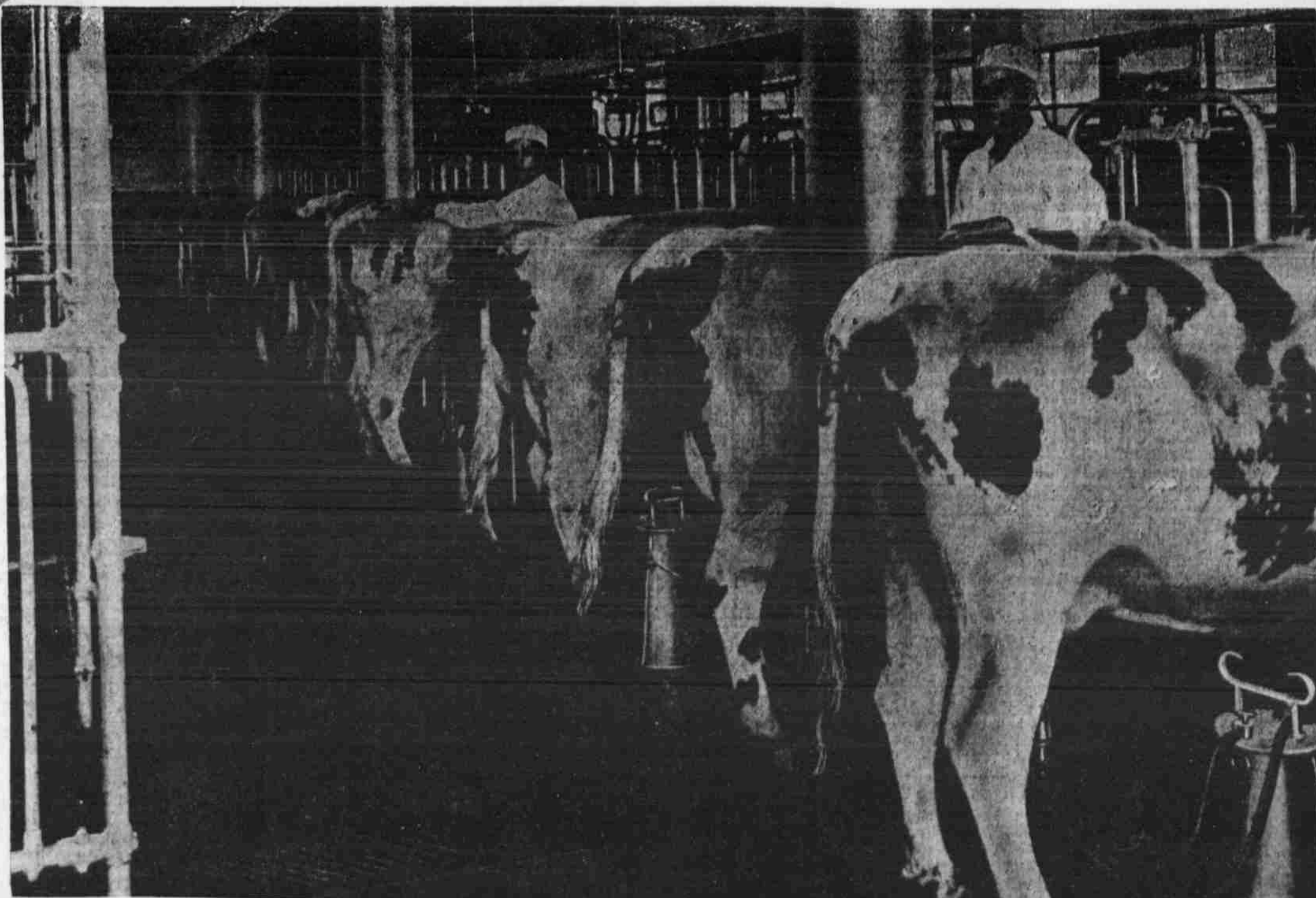
Of the thousands of milk users in Omaha very few know the meaning of "certified milk." That doubtless is due to the fact that there are comparatively few Omahans using it, because of its excessive cost. To individual patrons the price is just twice that of milk purchased from the ordinary milk dealer. To start with every ounce of it must test up to 25 per cent more butter fat than is required of any other milk. That insures the wholesomeness of it.

But the most important thing is the iron-clad provisions of the city ordinance which provides the conditions under which producers may sell their product as certified milk. Here are a few of the provisions: The sanitary inspection of the dairy must register 95 per cent or better of the score required by the federal government.

Certified milk must be taken from cows not reacting to tuberculin tests and each cow must be tuberculin tested every six months for two years and once annually thereafter, by a regularly licensed veterinarian. Water used at the dairy must be examined twice a year, both chemically and bacteriologically.

Certified milk must contain 4 per cent butter fat; this is 25 per cent more than required of any other milk. Bacterial counts shall be made at least twice a week. The caps on the milk bottles are furnished by the Omaha Milk Commission, through the health office and shall bear the date upon which it must be sold.
