HOGAN ARGUES FOR THE BANK

WASHINGTON, May 18. - Argument on motions by government counsel to dismiss for lack of jurisdiction the injunction suit brought by the Riggs National bank against Treasury officials began yesterday in the District of Columbia supreme court, Frank J. Hogan, for the bank occupied practically the entire day opposing the government's contentions, and will resume tomorrow.

An indication of the bitterness with which the litigation will be fought developed soon after the case was called The opposing lawyers engaged in a heated wrangle over publicity methods employed in the proceedings, upon which Justice McCoy, presiding, called a halt with the announcement that "this court is not going to be used as a inboratory to test bad blood."

Ask Suit Be Dismissed.

Louis Brandels, Samuel Untermyer and associate counsel for Secretary McAdoo comptroller of the Currency Williams and Treasurer John Burke, who are charged with conspiring to wreck the Riggs bank, filed briefs in support of their motions to dismiss proceedings. They maintained that a suit involving the property of the United States is a suit against the United States, and that the government cannot be made a party to a suit without its consent. 
