## ENTRIES CLOSE IN BIG ATHLETIC MEET

Over Twenty-Five Athletes to Take Part in Big Event at Creighton Field Saturday.

### HIGH SCHOOL IS FAVORITE

Entries for the first annual outdoor Omaha athletic meet closed last night with the list totaling the names of over twenty-five athletes. The Omaha High school will enter the largest squad, sixteen men. Coach Tommy Mills submitted the names yesterday just before the entries closed. The Omaha Young Men's Christian association, Bellevue, the Triple A and the Council Bluffs Young Men's Christian association have also entered big squads.

A number of individuals who are proud possessors of gleaming records in the past are also entered and they are expected to annex a few points which will not be gathered up by any of the teams entered. Art May, former Cornhusker star, is one of the dash men who is picked to start something in the sprint.

Postlen, an old orthwestern man, is another sprinter who should show some form. Baxter, a half-miler, who has carried the colors of Dartmouth and the Chicago Athletic club, is also a favorite in that distance run. A. A. Marshall of Kansas is a ten-second man in the 100-yard dash and the odds favor his winning that sprint.

M. F. Jones, an old Grinnell man, is entered in four events and his records at college prove he has a good chance to carry away some honors if he can enter any of the old-time forms. Jones is entered in the 100-yard dash, shot-put, high and broad jumps.

High School is Favorite. The high school squad is running favorite as the showing Mills' crew made in the Missouri valley and state meets, both of which were won by the local schools, show that the interscholastic lads are a well balanced aggregation.

Al Newton is a favorite in both the high and broad jumps and Fullaway in honors. Carl Lutes is favorite in the expected to carry off the pole vault shot-putting event.

Preliminary heats in several of the events will be held in the morning, due to the large number of entries. Preliminaries in the 100-yard dash, 200-yard dash, high jump and hurdles will be started at 9:30 Saturday morning. The finals in these events as well as all heats in the remaining events will be staged in the afternoon.

In addition to the open events there will be two junior events, a five-yard dash and running broad jump. There will also be two relay, a half-mile relay and a quarter-mile relay.

The meet will be staged at Creighton field and tickets are now on sale at the Young Men's Christian association, Beaton Drug company and Townsend Gun company.

## WILSON TAUNTED BY SUFFRAGISTS

"Greatest Little Evader" is Term Applied to President by Two Women at New York.

THEY CAUSE A SCENE AT HOTEL

NEW YORK, May 18.—Mrs. Stanley McCormick, vice president of the National Woman Suffrage association, in a statement declared that the National association had no sympathy with the act of the two women suffragists who today caused a scene by trying to reach President Wilson in the hotel where he was the guest of honor at a luncheon.

They were taken in hand by secret service men, but prior to this they had succeeded in delivering to Secretary Tumulty a letter for the president. It was written on the stationery of the National executive committee of the Congressional Union for Woman Suffrage, and appealed to the president for his "powerful aid to remove the political disabilities of women."

"Greatest Little Evader." The women suffragists eluded the heavy guard stationed in the hotel and succeeded in reaching the floor where the president was and managed to see Secretary Tumulty and gave him a letter to be delivered to the president. As Mr. Tumulty was walking away from the door, one of the women exclaimed: "Mr. Wilson is the greatest little evader I know!"

Mr. Tumulty told the women they were impolite and would receive no answer to their letter.

The women went to the lobby and waited. They told reporters it would be useless for the president to attempt to elude them.

"If necessary we'll hire a tug and go out to the Mayflower to see him," one of them said.

When the president left the room where the luncheon was held the two women, who had returned, stepped out of anteroom, and, confronting him, exclaimed:

"Votes for women! Votes for women! Mr. President, we have a message for you."

They got no further in their appeal. Four secret service men seized them quickly and took them away. The president smiled.

Urges Votes for Women. WASHINGTON, May 17.—Votes for women were urged as a remedy for industrial unrest before the commission on industrial relations here today by Mrs. Chrysal Eastman Benedict of New York, representing the Congressional Union for Woman Suffrage.

Mrs. Benedict declared the commission should immediately report to President Wilson advocating a federal constitutional amendment for national woman suffrage. Commissioner Lenson suggested that the commission could only report to congress, and that congress would not be in session until December.

"I had thought of that, too," said Mrs. Benedict. "Make the report to Wilson. Wilson can do it. If you would make him understand that the future of the democratic party depends upon this issue we would get suffrage. You could let him know about it without making a formal report."

## VENOM SHOWN AT RIGGS SUIT TRIAL

Lawyers Rage at Hearing. But Court Says Not Laboratory to Test Bad Blood.

### HOGAN ARGUES FOR THE BANK

WASHINGTON, May 18.—Argument on motions by government counsel to dismiss for lack of jurisdiction the injunction suit brought by the Riggs National bank against Treasury officials began yesterday in the District of Columbia supreme court, Frank J. Hogan, for the bank, occupied practically the entire day opposing the government's contentions, and will resume tomorrow.

An indication of the bitterness with which the litigation will be fought developed soon after the case was called. The opposing lawyers engaged in a heated wrangle over public methods employed in the proceedings, upon which Justice McCreary, presiding, called a halt with the announcement that "this case is not going to be used as a laboratory to test bad blood."

Ask Suit Be Dismissed. Louis Brandeis, Samuel Untermyer and associate counsel for Secretary McAdoo, Comptroller of the Currency Williams and Treasurer John Burke, who are charged with conspiring to wreck the Riggs bank, filed briefs in support of their motions to dismiss proceedings. They maintained that a suit involving the property of the United States in a suit against the United States, and that the government cannot be made a party to a suit without its consent. The officers in their dealings with the bank, it is declared, acted in their official capacity and within the law.

The right of the bank to sue in equity also was challenged on the ground that it had an adequate remedy at law. Mr. Hogan charged in his argument that a political aspect had been injected into the case and that 80 per cent of the affidavits filed by Secretary McAdoo had nothing to do with the proceeding. He cited authorities to show that officials of the government may be made amenable to the court when they attempt to usurp authority and asserted that Mr. McAdoo usurped authority by assuming to be the paying officer of the United States and withholding \$5,000 interest on bonds due the Riggs bank to satisfy penalties imposed by Comptroller Williams. Mr. Hogan said: "We hold to the bar an individual who has abandoned being a law administrator and become a law violator."

The withdrawal of the American Red

## Cross and Panama Canal funds from deposit at the Riggs National bank, the attorney declared, was brought about through the influence of Secretary McAdoo and Comptroller Williams.

"I thought he meant what he said," continued the attorney. "It now appears from Williams' affidavit that he was merely attempting to bully the officers in deposits, and they say that the bank might not be as solvent as it is today if they had not helped it."

The attorney dwelt at length upon demands for information made upon the bank by Mr. Williams. He said the directors of the bank held a meeting last summer and asked the comptroller just what he desired the bank to do, but that no advice or suggestions were received. In demanding a penalty of \$5,000 from the bank for failure to submit a report of the loans of the institution for eighteen years, Mr. Hogan declared that Comptroller Williams made an erroneous calculation in order to stipulate

that amount, which was one in interest to the bank and notified the bank that it would be subject to a further and continuing penalty.

Attempt to Bully. "We thought he meant what he said," continued the attorney. "It now appears from Williams' affidavit that he was merely attempting to bully the officers in deposits, and they say that the bank might not be as solvent as it is today if they had not helped it."

Touching upon the statement by Mr. McAdoo's affidavit that the secretary did not know but two officers of the National City bank of New York, and that he had no dealings with that institution to arouse hostility, Mr. Hogan said the National City bank was in no way connected with this case and did not own a dollar's worth of stock in the

Riggs bank, and that the plaintiff had made no accusations in regard to Mr. McAdoo's relations with the National City bank.

"Mr. McAdoo charges that he was not made a defendant in this case in good faith," he added, "but in order that his name might be circulated under protection of the law. That is a contemptible and unfounded aspersion upon Senator Bailey and myself as counsel for the plaintiff."

Bootlegger Breaks Jail. WESTPORT CITY, Ia., May 17.—(Special Telegram)—Frank Walth, one of a band of seven bootleggers convicted the last term of court, escaped from jail last night by sawing off the bars of his cell. He is also wanted by federal authorities.
