RESISTLESS TEUTON SWEEP CONTINUING

Spand, fifty-seven miles southeast of Berlin. In the first section the German advance has not developed beyond the stage of patrols and scouting parties. In the second section there are large opposing forces, which are prevented from engaging in hand-to-hand encounters by the wide sweep of the sea, over which sharp artillery duels are occupying. The heaviest German forces evidently have been concentrated in the third section in an attempt to reach the right bank of the river. Such a move is considered extremely hazardous by Russian critics as long as the Russian control of the three most important fortifications and bridges across the river, at Prezemyl, Jaroslau and Sienawa, enabling them to throw troops across the left bank for the purpose of cutting off advancing Germans.
