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STUDENT NURSE IS VICTIM OF ATTACK

Unidentified Assailant Chokes Miss Jitka Janicek at the Child-Saving Institute.

NIGHT BEFORE SWANSON DEATH

Miss Jitka Janicek, a student nurse at the Child Saving Institute, 619 South Forty-second street, was the victim Thursday night of an unidentified assailant, who choked her as she approached the porch after she had lain in wait in the yard of the institution.

The attack occurred shortly after 9 o'clock, as Miss Janicek was returning to the institute after having been absent a short time. The man who attacked her evidently had been lurking in the yard. As she neared the steps of the porch he seized her and choked her.

When she first saw him Miss Janicek screamed, thus quickly securing assistance. She is 21 years of age and of prepossessing appearance.

Friends of Miss Janicek assert their belief that the man who attacked her is of the same degenerate type as the murderer of Miss Swanson and that he may be the same person.

Will the federal government know when it gets done surveying the Missouri river at Florence, or will it not? Lieutenant Colonel Deakne of the United States army, who is commissioned to make a preliminary survey of the river from Kansas City to the northern limits of Florence, has written to the Commercial club of Omaha to learn where the northern limits of Florence are.

Thereby having an interrogation point. For the line of the village limits no longer strikes the river where it did a few years ago. The Missouri river used to flow along Florence at a point nearly a half mile farther west than it does now. Then the line was clear. But the river carved a new channel farther east and left a big square strip of ground that has never been officially taken into the city limits.

Now it is a question whether the line that then marked the city limits should be considered to be extended across the land that has never been included in the limits.

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BAD CHECK ARTISTS BEWARE

New Nebraska Law Provides Stiff Penalty for Issuing Checks Upon Imaginary Accounts.

BOON FOR BUSINESS HOUSES

With bad checks floating just now more abundantly than usual, the persons who issue them, when caught, are subject to a more severe penalty than they have been hitherto under the Nebraska law.

The making, drawing, uttering or delivering of such a check or draft, according to the new law, shall be prima facie evidence of intent to defraud.

What this new law is of great interest to the bankers, the bankers have not actually been the heaviest losers in this fraudulent checking practice. The saloons and many other business houses have lost heavily, as these are the places where most of such checks are cashed.

Common Practice. It is a common practice for men to step into a saloon or other business house on Saturday afternoon, especially after banking hours, and cash their weekly pay check. Likewise it is a common practice for crooks to make fake checks and step into these places along with the working men and cash a check on these days when the bartender or business man is in the habit of cashing checks for working people.

When these bad checks are presented at the bank for clearance, and it is found that the drawer of the check has no account, the man who cashed it naturally is the loser.

Prior to the last session of the legislature, Jesse C. McNish, president of the Nebraska Bankers' association, took personal charge of the preparation and introduction of an adequate measure to cover this bad checking matter. The bill was introduced in the senate by Senators Walter Kiechel and B. K. Bushe. It was passed with the emergency clause, signed by the governor in March and is now in effect.

Could Not Prosecute. Formerly in such cases, in order to prosecute a man, it was necessary to prove that the maker of the check represented that he had money in the bank to cover the check, and only rarely was that possible. Besides, it was only a misdemeanor to make a bad check for any amount less than \$5. Thus when the culprit got into another state he could not be brought back.

The full text of the new law follows: Section 1. That whoever, with intent to defraud by obtaining money, merchandise, property, credit, or thing of value, although not express mention is made in reference thereto, or who, in the payment of any obligation, shall make, draw, utter or deliver any check, draft or order for the payment of money upon any bank, depository, person, firm or corporation, knowing at the time the check, draft, drawing, uttering or delivering that the maker or drawer has not sufficient funds in or credit with such bank, depository, person, firm or corporation for the payment of such check, draft or order in full upon its presentation, shall, upon conviction, be fined not less than one hundred dollars (\$100) nor more than five thousand dollars (\$5,000), to which may be added imprisonment in the state prison for not less than one year nor more than five years.

The making, drawing, uttering or delivering of such check or draft or order as aforesaid shall be prima facie evidence of intent to defraud. The word "credit" as used herein shall be construed to mean an arrangement or understanding with the bank, depository, person, firm or corporation for the payment of such check, draft or order.

Quinby Succeeds As an Educator

Laurie J. Quinby is back from Denver, where he went to help out the campaign for a single tax referendum measure submitted at the election last week.

"Single tax didn't win," said Quinby, "but in my opinion we made a mighty good showing under the conditions. Only 23,000 votes were cast, of which we polled nearly a third, or to be more exact, 7,586, and we didn't have a newspaper looking pleasant at us. They all pitched into imported single taxers, and never mentioned or noticed anything we did or said all the time we were holding meetings, debates and street corner talks."

"I don't believe the single tax proposition would have polled 2,000 votes but for work of the outsiders. As an educational campaign the effort was a success."

AUTOISTS TO BOOST FOR STOP-IN-OMAHA MOVE

Automobile clubs in Buffalo, Cleveland, Detroit, Pittsburgh, Cincinnati and Columbus have now arranged to advise all tourists from those places who are venturing to San Francisco this summer to route through Omaha. A few of these places had not expected to route their tourists through Omaha until after Manager Parrish of the bureau of publicity of Omaha visited them and told them of the advantages of such routing and of the advantages of making a stop in Omaha en route.
