

DEATH ENDS WILD CAREER OF ZIGICH

Principal in South Omaha Murder is Himself Killed at Kansas City.

WAS MOST GENERALLY FEARED

Mike Zigich, principal in one murder and several shooting scrapes in the Serbian colony of South Omaha, was shot and killed Sunday in Kansas City, Mo., by Mike McDonald, whom Zigich assaulted on the street.

The death of Zigich ends a feud that began in the Serbian-Austrian colony of South Omaha two years ago when one Piti Babich shot and killed Vucovich. Babich was acquitted of the murder at which Zigich testified for the state. Later Babich was shot and killed by Zigich who claimed that his victim had made threats against him. For this killing Zigich was acquitted.

Terror to City.

After his release on the murder charge Zigich became a terror in the local foreign colony. He was charged with having made threats against Joe Danovich and Nick Savalovich, two respectable citizens of the Austrian colony.

Later, for carrying concealed weapons, former Judge James Callahan imposed a jail sentence upon Zigich, who nevertheless was able to secure his release.

Ex-Convict Caught Prowling in Dundee

While prowling around residences in Dundee at 2 o'clock Monday morning, a man who gave his name as A. R. Atterberg, and admitted he was an ex-convict, was apprehended by Village Marshal Livingston. The suspect was slightly intoxicated. Livingston said, and could not explain his presence in a quiet residence neighborhood at that hour, so the officer took him to the Omaha jail for safe keeping. Atterberg said he was a stenographer from Tulsa, Okl., and said he had served a prison sentence in Texas for bank robbery. He is being held for investigation.

HEARS THAT HIS SISTER'S SON IS WOUNDED IN WAR

A postal card sent from a hospital in London, England, to City Clerk Flynn and mentioned in the newspaper, has resulted in conveying to Jan Dealee of 323 U street, South Omaha, information that his sister's boy was wounded during the German invasion into Belgium.

Ernest Vaneste was shot in an arm and was among the Belgian refugees to London. He remembered that his uncle was in Omaha and employed as a butcher. The uncle called at the city hall and received the postal card from Clerk Flynn.

MATTERS GIVEN ANOTHER MONTH TO FILE APPEAL

Thomas H. Matters, Omaha attorney, has been given an additional month in which to file the papers in his appeal to the United States circuit court of appeals. Judge Frank J. Williams has signed the order giving Matters until July 1 instead of to June 1 to file his appeal.

This was done because of the voluminousness of the transcripts and the hundreds of objections filed by his attorneys.

INJUDICIOUS CHOICE OF WORDS RESULTS IN PINCH

GREECE AND BALKAN NATIONS ON ALERT

Grave illness of King Constantine Affording Opportunity for War Party to Gain Strength.

ROUMANIA IS WATCHING RUSSIA

LONDON, May 24.—With the announcement of Italy's declaration of war against Austria, London today awaited with deepest interest the outbreak of actual hostilities between the two former allies. Communication across the Austro-Italian border has been brought to a standstill; Italian mobilization is being perfected and in Rome today decrees were issued respecting measures of an economic nature, establishing a

consorship and providing for public safety.

Greece, whose anxiety over the illness of King Constantine has been increased by the bulletin issued today, is closely following the situation as regards the relations between Austria and Italy, and dispatches from Athens state that the war party is now gaining in strength and that the recall of ex-Premier Eleutherios Venizelos is imminent.

Roumania, on the other hand, seems anxious to ascertain the outcome of the great Galician battles before making a declaration, while Bulgaria is waiting for more definite results of the attack on the Dardanelles.

Roumania may have some time to wait, as Russia has commenced a counter offensive against the Austro-Germans, who drove the third and Carpathian armies back to the Dan and Dniester river, and an entirely new battle is now developing. The Russians, with strong reinforcements, have crossed the San confluence with the Vistula and are advancing southward in an effort to outflank the Germans, who crossed the San in the vicinity of Jaroslau. They are also striking hard at the Austrians in Bukovina,

but apparently have made no further headway there, nor with their offensive in the Opatow region. The latter offensive, however, was a movement to uncover the German flank in Galicia, which it partly succeeded in doing.

In the Baltic provinces the Germans claim to have defeated the Russian northern wing in the region of Shavli and also to have repulsed the Russian attacks from the Duhya and Neman rivers.

In the west there has been a series of attacks along the greater part of the line, but no action of first importance.

Terror in Trieste At Opening of War

UDINE, Italy (Via Paris), May 24.—Terror reigns among the inhabitants of the Austrian seaport of Trieste, according to reports received here. Houses have been abandoned by the people and some buildings have been sacked. Police and soldiers are said to be in control everywhere in the city. An unknown person during the night succeeded in climbing the dome on the

Dasilica of San Giusto, the lofty situated cathedral in Trieste and planted the Italian tricolor at the top. Austrian gendarmes were engaged for several hours this morning removing the flag.

Fugitives from Austria continue to arrive at Udine by hundreds.
