## CHILDREN HONOR THE SOLDIER DEAD

Three Thousand Pupils of the Catholic Parochial Schools Gather at the Auditorium.

### N. H. LOOMIS IS THE SPEAKER

Three thousand children of Greater Omaha's twenty parochial schools will observe Memorial day with special exercises at the Auditorium Monday morning, under the auspices of the Knights of Columbus, as has been done each year for the last five years.

With patriotic songs, led by a large choir, a prayer for the soldier dead, Lincoln's famous Gettysburg address and an appropriate address by Nelson H. Loomis, solicitor general of the Union Pacific railroad, the big meeting will be a notable one among the various gatherings planned to observe the holiday in fitting style.

Under the guidance of pastors of the Catholic parishes and sisters of the school faculties, the happy youngsters will go to the Auditorium in special street cars, after attending Memorial day masses in the various churches. There will be keen rivalry among the children of the different schools, and each group will carry pennants and banners of its school and will indulge in school yells before the memorial services begin.

In past years the parochial school celebration of the holiday has been a most inspiring event. The general public is invited to attend.

To March by Schools. Promptly at 9 o'clock the exercises will begin, with W. C. Fraser presiding. The doors will be open at 9 o'clock to allow plenty of time for the school children to march in by schools and give their yells, and for the public to take seats in the boxes and balcony. The committee of Knights of Columbus has arranged to share the decorating of the big hall with the Grand Army of the Republic committee, which will have its usual public observance of the day at the Auditorium in the afternoon.

Rev. Father J. C. Buckley of the Benson church will open the program with an invocation, followed by the Lord's prayer, in which all the children will unite while standing. "America," "The Star Spangled Banner" and "Columbia, the Gem of the Ocean" will be sung by the great assembly of children, led by Prof. Theodore Rud, Reese and a large consolidated choir from the Catholic churches and an orchestra.

Nelson H. Loomis, the chief speaker of the occasion, will make his address on the life and achievements of General U. S. Grant. Rev. Father P. C. Gannon, pastor of St. Patrick's church and editor of the True Voice, will offer the prayer for the soldier dead, while the children stand with bowed heads. John J. Cordes, a student orator of Creighton university, will repeat Abraham Lincoln's Gettysburg address, which was originally delivered at the dedication of a national cemetery for civil war heroes on the great battlefield.

Mr. Philip Johnston, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. L. Johnston, who is completing his junior year at Oberlin, has been chosen to respond to the "guide oration" in the ivy planting ceremony at the senior class day exercises, June 15. This is a much coveted honor always bestowed on a member of the junior class.
