Ollie J. Kaneff is Dead from Injury Sustained on Knee

As the result of a severe bruise on his knee, sustained while getting out of an auto at the funeral of his brother, James, who committed suicide a month ago, Ollie J. Kaneff, saloonkeeper at 284 Farnam street, contracted blood poisoning and died at Clarkson hospital early Saturday morning. He made his home at 204 Dodge street with his wife and 6-year-old son, Jack, and had lived in Omaha since coming from Galesburg, Ill., in 1902. Funeral services will be held Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock at the Heslop chapel, with burial in Forest Lawn cemetery. The Fraternal Order of Eagles, of which he was a life member, will have charge of the funeral.

Mr. Murray notes a good increase in the travel to California and is of the opinion that next month it will come up to expectations.

DUPLICATE ON THE PAY ROLL

Mistake Made in Submitting List of Employees of the City Park Board.

NAME IS SCRATCHED OFF ROLL

An examination of the records of the city comptroller's office shows that two city warrants, for \$50 each and made payable to John Lunbeck, have not been called for and they now await a claimant. This unusual situation led to an investigation, as the general rule is that city employees are eager to secure their warrants and get their money as soon as possible. Forgetting to draw warrants is not an addition of city employees, it is stated. One of the unclaimed warrants is No. 5064, of date of May 4, issued for \$50 for ten days' labor performed by John Lunbeck, under Assistant Superintendent Adams of the park department. The other warrant is No. 19928, dated May 18, for similar amount and service. When Mr. Adams brought in his time book Friday to have the labor payroll for the last two weeks made out, he read the name of John Lunbeck, as he had done on two previous occasions. His attention was called to the fact that two warrants already issued for this man have not been claimed, and after some questioning the assistant superintendent admitted there might be some mistake. The result was that the name of John Lunbeck did not go into the current payroll, which will be sent to the city council next Tuesday morning. Asked for an explanation as to the identity and address of the mysterious John Lunbeck, Mr. Adams said: "John Lunbeck is John Lunwork and is employed at Fontanelle park. I do not have the address. These fellows sometimes give the wrong names." Further examination of the records and payrolls showed that there was no "John Lunwork," but there were entries for "Charles Lundmark" on payroll of May 18 for \$21, and for "John Lundmark" on payroll of May 4 for \$20. It appears that John Lunwork, Charles Lundmark and John Lindmark are one and the same person, but this still leaves John Lunbeck as a man of mystery. The situation is said to be obviously a clerical error on the part of Assistant Superintendent Adams in carrying the name of John Lunbeck on his time book for a considerable period, notwithstanding he admits now there is no such workman, although he had his name included in two payrolls and offered the name for a third payroll. The city legal department was asked for advice as to the best way to straighten the records of the two unclaimed warrants, and the reply was that the warrants should be remitted to the treasurer to the credit of the city and thus offset the entries made on the payrolls. This will be done.

MAY WHEAT TOUCHES LOWEST POINT OF MONTH

Wheat continued on the down grade, touching the lowest point of the month, \$1.34 5/8 bushel, though most of the sales were 2 to 2 1/2 cents higher. Sweet carloads were on the market.

Corn was 1/4 to 1 cent off, selling at 7 1/2 1/2 cents per bushel, with fifty-four cars offered.

Data were weak and sustained a decline of 1/4 to 1 cent, the prices being 47 1/2 to 48 cents per bushel. Receipts were fifteen cars.
