SUICIDE REVEALS STRANGE FACTS

Body of James E. Davis is Found Hanging from Rope in Barn—Mystery Leads to Deed.

MIGHT HAVE BEEN DRUGGED

The body of James E. Davis, aged 35 years, was found Tuesday morning hanging by the neck from a rope which had been attached to an iron staple, in the loft of the barn to the rear of the family residence at 4702 North Thirty-sixth street. Dwight Davis, aged 11 years, discovered the body when he was sent to call his father to breakfast.

Davis has been employed in the auditor of disbursements department of the Union Pacific for the last two years, and previous to that time worked for the Burlington railroad in this city. His business and domestic affairs, according to his family, friends and associates, were absolutely normal. No reason has been ascertained why he should take his life.

He was an active member of the Woodmen of the World and had served as banker for Druid camp No. 34 for some time. The duties of this office had kept him at work late into the night recently and when he came home Tuesday morning about 2 o'clock Mrs. Davis thought nothing unusual of his late appearance until he told her that he had not been working. Upon questioning him he replied that he stopped in a saloon early in the evening and had one glass of beer. After that he remembered nothing till he awoke about 1 o'clock in a room at the Drexel hotel.

Mrs. C. H. Larson, 408 North Thirty-sixth street, niece of Mrs. Davis, who had been spending the night with her aunt, because of the latter's illness, stated that she heard her uncle get up shortly before breakfast time and later go to the basement and out the cellar entryway. She gave little heed to the incident, thinking he had gone to feed the chickens.

When breakfast had been served Dwight was sent to the barn and found his father hanging through the trap door leading to the loft. He ran screaming from the place and Captain Kline of the Salvation Army, who lives in the neighborhood, was summoned and cut the man down. Although the body was still warm, life was extinct.

Dr. Charles Shook from police headquarters was summoned and brought the primor, but asserted that strangulation had already made his services of no avail. Coroner Crosby, who is a close personal friend of the dead man, asserts that Davis is the last person on earth he would consider as liable to commit suicide. Davis is survived by his wife, who is completely prostrated and under the care of a physician, and two sons, Dwight and Maynard, aged 8 years. His mother, Mrs. Annie Davis, resides at 412 Grand avenue, and a sister, Mrs. Charles Anderson, at Thirty-sixth and Grand avenue. Inquiries at the Drexel hotel have failed to disclose any evidence so far as to Davis having stopped there. He had not been robbed during the evening, as practically the same amount of money that he had on his person when he left home was found. An inquest will be held.

NEW YORK, June 1.—Soldier Bartfield of the United States army surprised fight followers during a series of outdoor bouts at Ebbets field, Brooklyn, today, when he held Mike Gibbons, the St. Paul middleweight, to even terms in a ten-round bout. Gibbons weighed 135 pounds and Bartfield 145. Gibbons exhibited his usual cleverness, but he was never able to solve the soldier's defense, while at times Bartfield outfought Gibbons at his own game. At the end honors were equally divided.

Omaha Boy to Enter Gotham to Frisco Aeroplane Flight

Word just received in Omaha by Bert Le Bron is to the effect that Ralph McMillan, the stadium speedway aviator, will be an entrant in the New York to Frisco flight, with seventy odd other aviators, for purses aggregating \$50,000. McMillan will fly as a representative of the Speedway association, which will buy for the purpose a new 20-horse-power military type Curtiss biplane, according to Le Bron's announcement.

The local birdman will shortly leave for the Curtiss factory at Hammondsport, N. Y., to take charge of the new plane and make practice flights in it prior to the start of the big coast-to-coast event. The letter will be started July 4, under rules limiting flying time to ten hours per day, and the finish is scheduled for Columbus day, October 12, at the San Francisco exposition. Omaha will be one of the chief stopping points on the aerial route, every machine being required to check in and out here at the speedway.
