OMAHA NURSE WHO HAS DISAPPEARED FROM GLENWOOD.

GLENWOOD, Ia., June 2.—(Special)—The absence from her home of Dora Walling-Riley is causing her relatives and friends in Glenwood considerable uneasiness. Mrs. Riley is 27 years of age, weighs 106 pounds and is five feet in height. She is next to the youngest child of Arch Walling of Glenwood. She was in good health, and had been making her home with her brother, Sidney, in West Glenwood, during the sickness of his wife. She was married in Omaha in January, 1915, to Joseph Riley, an employe of a hospital at that place; and has been in Glenwood, her old home, about two months. She left her brother's house at 8 o'clock Thursday afternoon, May 27, telling Mrs. Walling she was going to the postoffice, and has not been seen by any one since, so far as known.

On her right thumb is the fresh scar of a treatment for keloid, and over it was a dressing protected by a red rubber finger stall. She wore a tan raincoat black wool skirt, tan waist, tan-medium-sized hat, trimmed with ribbon bow of the same color, and a bunch of cherries, and black shoes, with possibly cloth tops, and rubbers. No trace of her can be found at the depot; and the ivory stable and auto traffic was suspended on account of bad roads.
